

JOE M'MAHON CAPTURES BOOZE CACHE, KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, April 24.—The alleged Ashland-Klamath Falls daily liquor caravan service was seriously disrupted yesterday afternoon when two rum runners, Wm. W. McCampbell and W. H. Todd, were discovered by State Traffic officer McMahon and Deputy Sheriff Snyder in the act of caching a five-gallon keg of moonshine in some brushwood two miles out of Klamath Falls, on the Ashland highway.

Snyder and McMahon hid in some nearby bushes, witnessed the carrying of the five-gallon keg into the brush and the carrying of an empty keg from the hiding place back to the car. When the two rum runners reached the car, Snyder and McMahon stepped up to the car, and at the point of revolvers ordered McCampbell and Todd to drive to the Klamath court house, where they were charged with transportation of liquor and lodged in jail. Todd gave his residence as Ashland.

According to information, the point where the two men were seen to cache the liquor, is a part of a well organized rum ring.

SAVES HOME BY GIVING BURGLAR 50 DOLLAR BILL

NEW YORK, April 24.—Alfred Bohm, a retired Brooklyn business man, has found his unique burglary insurance effective after seven years. Bohm, fearing that burglars would break into his summer bungalow at Grandview, N. Y., and wreck its furnishings during the winter months, has left a \$50 bill in the library each fall. With the bill he had left a note reading:

"If you succeed in breaking in, please accept this \$50 and depart at once. Do not damage the furniture. There are no valuables in the house. Thanks, Alfred Bohm."

For seven years the bill was not disturbed. When Bohm visited the bungalow this year the bill was gone, nothing had been disturbed and across the face of the note was scrawled a simple "thanks."

START IMPROVEMENT WORK, UNION CREEK

JAIL DELIVERY AT ALBANY IS FOILED BY DRY OFFICIAL

ALBANY, Ore., April 24.—Sheriff Frank Richard was attacked last night by two prisoners when he went into the jail corridor to place the prisoners in their cages for the night. He was rescued by State Probation Officer Duckworth, who rushed into the jail when he heard the disturbance.

Harry P. Ramsay, held on a burglary charge and another prisoner of whose identity the sheriff is not certain, jumped upon him and started to beat him, Richard reported. Duckworth struck Ramsay and rendered him unconscious. The other assailant immediately retreated.

Sheriff Richard said he believed the attack was part of a plot to effect a jail delivery.

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS SHOWN CAMP FILM
