The children with defects were referred to their family physician for further diagnosis and treatment. There were no serious defects found, there were defects that might become serious very soon if not attended to.

## MINING NEWS OF SOUTHWESTERN OREGON

Edited by Southwestern Oregon Mining Bureau.

### Have Confidence in Mining.

Suspicion of mining, fostered by the fanatic derisives who started the blue-sky law craze, is beginning to diminish in other business circles. Money is pouring into the mining industry from outside channels. The old game is getting back on its feet. Organizations and publications that led in the assault against the mining business are beginning to repent and change their tune. Now and then a great newspaper departs from its recent course and begins to feature mining as a news subject and favor it editorially. Few of the exclusive business papers, as yet, pay any attention to mining that its importance to the world deserves. The New York Journal of Commerce, the New York Commercial, the Chicago Journal of Commerce, the similar papers in Portland and San Francisco, are pitifully incomplete in this particular. The Seattle Journal of Commerce is beginning to carry mining news. Washington state newspapers, which supported the blue sky advocates when the epidemic broke out, are mostly on the other side or non-committal now—with the exception of the Seattle Times and P. I. Recently the New York Herald-Tribune, one of the most conservative dailies in the east, created considerable chagrin among certain investment brokers by publishing the following opinion:

"One of the things that investment bankers have had to admit is that the gold and silver dividends of the United States during the past two years are greater than the combined dividends of all banking institutions of this country, and on the head of that the government figures show that the average returns on capital invested by banking interests to be about 6 1/2 per cent, while the returns on mining was 182 per cent, and Dunn and Bradstreet show that only 32 per cent of mining investment fail against 54 per cent failure in other lines of business."

The impression is rapidly spreading that the whole blue sky hysteria was cunningly devised by a group of New York and Chicago financial houses to get control of a greater share of the investing public's savings.

The series of bank failures in the middle west and mountain states, brought about by had investments in farm paper, have done a great deal to prove to the public that bank deal is possible in any business. Farming is dependent on the caprices of wind, water and winter. No cyclone ever blew an ore body out of the owners ground. Railroads are failing now and then, due to ship and motorbus competition. There is competition among mines, but no substitutes for minerals. Public utility corporations are finding it increasingly difficult to pay dividends because of the growth of rate regulation and demands for public ownership. There is no serious movements for nationalization of minerals. The great industrial corporations, whose shares are attracting public attention, are practically without exception, heavy users of mine products; they cannot grow and prosper without adding to the demand for the stores of nature's warehouse.

Mining is not today—and never was—a picker's game. But as a substantial business proposition, a producing mine with any considerable ore body is a more desirable property to own than a railroad, a farm, a commission house or power or gas plant, and many a factory—Mining Truth.

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### Coeur d'Alene.

The dividends paid by mines for 1924 in the Coeur d'Alenes amounted to \$4,487,532, and the grand total of dividends in that district amounted to \$114,187,605.

Realizing the importance of mining, the Seattle Mining Men's club has been organized, and weekly luncheons are being held.  
The next meeting of the Mining Bureau will be held at the rooms of the bureau on May 2. There is going to be a crowd down from Gold Hill and many others have promised to be here. In view of the prospective development in the immediate future every member is urged to be present at the meeting and make whatever sacrifice is necessary. The recent strike at the Greenback mine, the resumption of the activity all along Coyote Creek, the placer development along Foothills Creek, the projected tunnel and development work at Gold Hill, and the resumption of activity at all these are all indications of what we may expect.

The erection of the Worton plant for the treatment of black sands is well under way, equipment is being installed and Mr. Worton states that he hopes to be ready for work by May 1. These men have shown themselves to be live wires and merit the full support of the mining fraternity. Every miner, whether he is a black sand man or not, should make himself familiar with this activity.

A month from the next meeting, the annual meeting of the bureau will be held. Plans for this affair will be formulated, committees will be made, and a general discussion of ways and means will be held.

The recent reports concerning the oil well at Eugene should bring shame to that group of short sighted citizens who throw cold water on all efforts toward development of the latest resources of the state. Whether the viability of Eugene shall become a full justification of the efforts of sinking a well, and those who promoted the work must be regarded at the present time as public benefactors. We, of southwestern Oregon, who have found such a difficult struggle to maintain here the importance and value of the mining industry will all be gratified at this justification of the Olson Brothers' enterprise. Nothing succeeds like success, and the outlook for the smelter at Gold Hill is very much better.

The recent unprecedented rainfall has raised all the streams much to the surprise and chagrin of the placer miners, many of whom had cleaned up, and closed down for the season, and with the snow in the mountains, and the unusual amount of moisture in the ground, the year's run promises to be of long duration.

It is interesting to note the contrast between the development of the platinum resources in this part of the world, the Ural mountains, and like sections. The Engineering and Mining Journal devotes page after page to an exposition of the platinum possibilities in the wilds of South Africa, and the Russian frontier, but can hardly spare room for a commendatory paragraph on our deposits here at home. Millions are readily available for these far away prospects in which half of the money is wasted, and half of the balance in transportation. The grass is always greener in your own back yard.

Work has again been started on the Cohen mine in the Holland district, between the Siskion and the Boswell. In the 70's this mine was a large producer, but has been inactive for some years. This mine is a free gold proposition, and should become a large proposition.
