

COUNTY COURT IS IN FAVOR OF TAX ON MOTOR TRUCKS

SALEM, April 27.—The state highway commission recently passed a resolution opposing the referendum on the bus and truck bill as follows: "Resolved that: The state highway commission desires to declare its hearty approval of the attitude of the State Association of County Judges

and Commissioners in its recent declaration against the proposed referendum on the so-called Bus and Truck bill recently passed by the legislature. "The highway system of Oregon is not constructed and maintained by general taxation, but by fees in the form of license and gas tax paid by the individual motorists of the state. The burden, therefore, should be equitably distributed. The initial heavy construction and heavy reconstruction costs are caused in the main by the users of heavy motor equipment. Many of our roads will have to be rebuilt and be constructed in a manner to withstand this equipment, in our opinion, this bill is not to levy a confiscatory fee, but does attempt in a manner to distribute the burden equitably among those who use the highways." This action has been approved by the Jackson county court.
