Girls outnumber the boys by 829 in the senior classes of the high schools of Oregon this year, according to a report prepared by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction.

Of 5257 high school seniors in Oregon this year, 2254 are boys and 2993 are girls, the report shows. Based on the standard of efficiency adopted by the Russell Sage Foundation, Roseburg high school leads the state, with boys representing 63 per cent of the total enrollment in the senior class this year. Corvallis ranks second with 55 per cent. Pendleton's class is 54 per cent boys, Dallas 52 per cent, Ashland at Klamath Falls 51 per cent each.
