

9094 NAMES ARE NEEDED FOR THE 1925 REFERENDUM

SALEM, Ore., April 28.—Referendum petitions filed with the secretary of state on or before May 28 to be successful in getting on the ballot the measures attempted to be referred, must contain at least 9094 names, according to an opinion handed down by Attorney General Van Winkle today in reply to an inquiry by Secretary Koser. This is five per cent of half the total vote cast for H. H. Belt, O. P. Coshaw and Percy R. Kelly, who were candidates for justice of the supreme court, the ballot directing the voter to "vote for two."

The Van Winkle opinion says that the question is hard to determine and to be safe the attorney general advises the petitioners to get five per cent of the highest vote cast for any officer although the constitution specifies justice of the supreme court.

"This provision of the constitution was, no doubt, adopted because at the time of the adoption of the initiative and referendum amendment there was but one justice of the supreme court to be elected at each election in which the whole number of votes and voters would be the same," says the opinion.

"In the present instance, there being three candidates for justice of the supreme court and two justices to be elected, if the presumption be indulged that every person who voted for justice of the supreme court exercised his full right of suffrage and followed the direction on the ballot to 'vote for two,' and each elector voted for two persons as justice of the supreme court, the whole number of persons so voting would be one half of the whole number of votes cast for all three candidates for justice of the supreme court."

Since it is known that all voters would not vote for two the opinion says:

"The dilemma, therefore, presents itself which of several things to do, to rely on the presumption and computation above set forth; to attempt to ascertain the actual number of persons voting for justice of the supreme court, which would necessarily involve an inspection and counting of all of the ballots, which you are not authorized to do; or to take the highest number of votes cast for any officer, which appears contrary to the provision of the constitution. It is elementary that the law does not require what is impossible and therefore the counting of the ballots, or to otherwise accurately determine the actual number of votes cast for justice of the supreme court must be dismissed as not possible and not authorized."

The opinion points out that without a decision of the supreme court it seems impossible to determine what is the exact method to be followed, and in the absence of such an opinion the attorney general advises the secretary of state to proceed on the basis of five per cent of half the vote cast for the three candidates, but, to be safe, advises petitioners to get five per cent of the highest vote cast for any officer. In the last election the vote cast for president, United States senator, secretary of state, state treasurer and perhaps others would be higher, and five per cent of any of these would run the number of names up to approximately 13,000.

Heretofore the required names have been about 8,000.

The question arose relative to referendums of the bus bill, the titling act and the tobacco act.

PENDLETON, Ore., April 28.—Four Pendleton people, two men and two women, are in the hospital in College Place, Wash., not far from Walla Walla, as a result of injuries they suffered last night when the car in which they were driving left the highway and turned over on the Oregon-Washington highway near the Walla Walla river, this side of Walla Walla.

The injured are Mrs. Nell Thompson and Mrs. William Owens, and Dan and Jack Sullivan.

The women were the most seriously injured, according to the reports received here by the sheriff's office. Mrs. Thompson is said to have had her collar bone crushed and to have been otherwise hurt. Mrs. Owens suffered a fracture of one leg and is said to have suffered injuries to her back. The men were bruised and shocked.

PARIS INCLINED TO GO SLOW ON GERMAN THREAT

PARIS, April 28.—(By Associated Press.) The allied council of ambassadors at its meeting tomorrow will, it is understood, give Marshal Foch's report on Germany's violation of the Versailles treaty a quick scrutiny and will then await further study of the situation by the chancellors of the various interested powers before taking action.

This policy, it was said, in official circles this morning, will be pursued as the allies above all wish to avoid anything that might provoke further reaction in Germany such as was manifested in the election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg to the presidency.

Negotiations concerning the German security pact offer will be conducted on the same policy of avoiding anything that could be used as fuel for the reactionary campaign in Germany. Foreign Minister Briand will soon reply to the offer of Dr. Stresemann, the German foreign minister in such a way as to encourage possible continuation of the efforts toward an agreement. It was indicated, but without giving the hope that France will abandon her allies, Poland and Czechoslovakia with their vital interest in the question of Germany's eastern border which that nation desires to re-open eventually.

PREPARE FOR TROUBLE IN N. Y. ON MAY FIRST

NEW YORK, April 28.—Extra police guards will soon be placed on all public buildings, prominent churches and residences of well-known men, it is against possible activities of radical groups on May day. For some time special operatives have been watching the activities of groups of radicals who, it was felt, might possibly be influenced by the recent outrages in Bulgaria.

DANCING GIRL IN TEARS TELLS TALE OF HAREM LIFE

BOMBAY, April 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—Mumtaz Begum, dancing girl and former favorite of Maharaja of Indore, broke into tears today when called upon to identify blood-stained bits of clothing that belonged to Abdul Kadir Baula, rich Mohammedan merchant, who was killed at Malabar hill, near Bombay, on January 12. Nine men accused of the murder of the merchant, who was the Nautch girl's protector after escaping from the maharaja's household, pleaded not guilty yesterday when their trial began in the Bombay high court before a special jury.

Mumtaz today told the detailed story of her life with the Maharaja of Indore, in whose household she spent ten years as a dancing girl. During that time she was not allowed to leave Indore without the maharaja and when her baby was born her relatives were not allowed to see her. The latter years she spent at Indore before escaping to her recent protector, the Mohammedan merchant, she declared, were years of ill-treatment during which she was not able to eat or dress as she liked. She virtually was held prisoner in the maharaja's palace, she said.

DRY ENFORCEMENT SHAKE-UP STARTS HAYNES TO STICK

WASHINGTON, April 28.—A reorganization of the prohibition unit is in prospect, Assistant Secretary Andrews indicated today as a result of the month's study he has given to the bureau since he assumed office.

Secretary Andrews did not disclose the nature of the changes to be made but reiterated that Commissioners Haynes will remain for the present in charge of enforcement. There was every reason to predict satisfactory coordination between Mr. Haynes and his own office, the assistant secretary declared.

The new field marshal of prohibition declared reports that he would be "hard boiled" in putting through the proposed reorganization. What was intended he explained, was to give trusted workers encouragement and support and to weed out the crooks and others who are not functioning in the interest of law and order and to eliminate sentiment.
