

ODD FELLOWS TO HAVE DEDICATION OF MAUSOLEUM

Now that a mausoleum in the I. O. O. F. cemetery adjoining this city is assured, it has been deemed a matter of sufficient importance, not only to all Oddfellows, but the people of Medford in general, to warrant a dedication program in which the public will take considerable interest. At a meeting of the Medford lodge Tuesday evening a committee was appointed to map out a program which, if carried to a successful conclusion will make the services an event of some note.

The grand lodge I. O. O. F. of Oregon will meet in Ashland May 18 for a four days' session. The tentative plan is to invite the grand lodge officials to participate in the ceremonies and have the grand master lay the corner stone. Appropriate services will be arranged, including music and a short address by some noted speaker. Members of the Canton branch of the order, which includes all the lodges in Jackson county, dressed in their striking uniforms, will act as the body escort.

The Ashland lodge has charge of all arrangements for the reception and entertainment of the grand lodge members, and has expressed a willingness to make provision for the journey of those members to Medford, which, if the proposed plans are adopted, will be on the afternoon of May 20, about 4:30 o'clock, or immediately after the adjournment of the session for that day. The dedication will be taken by auto to Medford and at the conclusion of the services returned to Ashland in time for a big banquet in the evening.

WASHINGTON PEARS INJURED BY COLD

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 29.—Damaging effects of the extreme cold of last December on young orchards has become apparent in this vicinity. W. H. Wood, manager of the Washington Prune Growers' corporation, said today.

The freeze resulted in sour sap in young pear and prune trees, and the shot-hole borer, a worm that works under the bark, killing a shoot or limb, has become active, he said.

Warm weather has caused prunes to drop to some extent, but whether it will shorten the crop materially will not be known for another week, growers report.

AGED CRIPPLE IS HELD TO G. JURY, CONFESES CRIME

R. H. Sears, whose still eight miles northeast of Eagle Point, was raided yesterday morning by the local prohibition enforcement officer and others, and who from the time of his arrest, has admitted his guilt, made a clean breast of the matter to the arresting officers, prosecuting attorney's office and, also at his preliminary hearing in Judge Taylor's court this morning and was held to the grand jury in bond of \$1000, which he furnished today.

Because Sears is an invalid, about 60 years old, who gets about with difficulty with the aid of a crutch and cane, due to locomotor ataxia, the case is unusually tragic. The accused man's story, as told in court, was that last fall he was up against it financially, and hence took this means to get by, meaning his establishment of a still in the timber adjoining his homestead, on which he says there are \$1000 worth of mortgages.

He had only run off a few gallons of moonshine in the still, he says, when he was taken sick for nine weeks, and was preparing to operate the still again when the arresting officers came.

Sears testified that he got only \$10 a gallon for the little moonshine he claims he had manufactured and sold.

C. McCready, local federal enforcement officer, was the principal witness against the defendant.
