

EVENING FORUM CHAMBER OF C. TUESDAY, MAY 5

The directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce had their third meeting last night since their election on April 1st, with full attendance. Many matters of importance were brought out at last night's meeting, some of which the board were able to dispose of at once and others that were passed into the hands of various committees.

The special order of business, however, for this meeting was that of committee organization. Twenty-four various committees were organized with one member of the board on each and he to choose from the membership the rest of the personnel for his committee. It was evident that the board felt the need of the wholehearted support, both moral and financial, of the entire citizenship to handle the many important problems and activities that confront the community for the ensuing year.

It was decided to hold the chamber forums once each month, and it is probable that these will be moving meetings instead of at noon, which will give more time to bring all matters of importance before the membership.

The first of these forums will be held Tuesday evening, May 5th at 8:30 p. m. in the large dining room of the Hotel Medford and the details of this meeting will be announced at a later date. However, the chamber club will have charge of the entertainment, which is assurance that that part of the affair will be a success. A capable speaker will be engaged and will be announced later.

KICKS OUT RIGO WHEN WIFE AND CATS COME, TOO

NEW YORK, April 30.—John Hamberger, whose spirit of hospitality led him to grant the freedom of his apartment to the Hungarian violinist Rigo, once noted for his playing before the crowned heads of Europe, told Magistrate Levine today that his generosity reached the breaking point when his guest installed a wife, several cats, parrots and canaries as well as trunks and twenty-five umbrellas.

Hamberger was summoned to court by Mrs. Katherine Rigo who said she and her husband had been ordered from the apartment by their host at two o'clock in the morning to the accompaniment of loud and abusive language.

When Magistrate Levine found that Hamberger paid the rent, he dismissed the complaint, saying he could see no basis for it. Mrs. Rigo said she already had left the apartment and gone to one offered by friends.

DENTIST LOSES EYE IN AUTO ACCIDENT

SALEM, Ore., April 30.—Dr. Maurice Butler, a dentist of Independence lost his left eye and received a fractured skull near the left eye when an automobile in which he was riding with P. M. Powell of Salem skidded off the highway early today. The accident happened on the Salem-Dallas road about three miles west of Salem. Powell was not much hurt.

The attending physician reports Dr. Butler as progressing favorably considering the seriousness of the injury. Dr. Butler has been a resident of Independence for many years and is a son of Dr. Otis Butler, a physician.

Roosevelts Off on First Leg of Hunting Trip to "Top of the World" in Quest of Rare Ovis Poli



This photograph was taken as Theodore and Kermit Roosevelt were sailing from New York on board the Leviathan to meet the rest of their hunting party in England. Their goal is Chinese Turkestan, high in the Himalayas, and chief among their guests is the ovis poli, prototype of the mountain sheep of the world, which Marco Polo first described in the

Journal of his trip to the Celestial empire in the thirteenth century in such terms that for centuries he was thought to have embroidered the truth. Another object is the long-haired tiger that lurks in the jungle at the foot of the Tien Shan range. The expedition will obtain specimens of bird and animal life for the Field Museum of Chicago.

REPORT CONVICTS SURROUNDED BY CALIFORNIA POSSE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 30.—The Sacramento police station at 2 o'clock this afternoon announced word had been received from Hood, on the Sacramento river, fourteen miles south of Sacramento, that shooting was in progress near that place and that the convicts, Hall and Tanko may have been encountered by a posse.

Details were lacking as the informant at Hood hung up his telephone after declaring he was too busy to talk further.

Thirty additional officers were immediately dispatched to the scene in automobiles.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 30.—The "hide out" of Joe Tanko and Floyd Hall, the escaped San Quentin murderers was discovered shortly after noon today when Chief of Police Bernard McShane and Detective Sergeant Walter Cameron, acting on an "outside" tip discovered the discarded prison underwear of the ex-convicts in an apartment house at 620 M. street. The apartment house is operated by Fred Rosenberg, a city foreman and his wife.

Shortly after the murder of H. J. Litzberg, Sacramento merchant, two weeks ago, the men who had occupied the apartment had applied to her for a room. Mrs. Rosenberg told Chief McShane, she thought they were a couple of young lads seeking work here and gave them the apartment without question.

Today when McShane and Cameron searched the room the men had occupied they found, stuffed in an unused icebox, the prison underwear bearing the numbers of Tanko and Hall. A Tuesday's home edition of the Sacramento Bee was found beneath the mattress of the bed. In this copy of the Bee was recounted the details of the murder of Litzberg and the statement of police they believed Tanko and Hall were the murderers. It was due to this, the police believe, that the men left the apartment and made the break

FOREST FIRE DEVICE RECEIVED BY P. B. LOWD

Philip B. Lowd, district fire warden at Medford has received an instrument which automatically records both temperature and relative humidity. The machine which is technically known as a hygro-thermograph, will be kept in the post-office building here through the coming season and will be used to detect dangerous forest fire weather.

Relative humidity is recognized as one of the main factors influencing burning conditions in the forests and when this instrument shows a low relative humidity the whole fire fighting force of both the state and federal government will hold themselves ready to start to fires instantly.

PRINK CALLISON TO REMAIN, MISS SMITH ENGAGED

It has been learned that the school board this week had chosen the staff of teachers for the coming fiscal school year, with several exceptions that are still pending, and has mailed out the contracts to the various teachers, which will be received back by next Monday.

Following a meeting of the board Monday night the list of teachers will be made public—those that have signed contracts and those that have not.

While no information has been given out it is reported unofficially that Prink Callison, the athletic coach and high school instructor for several years past, has been offered a contract at the same salary as last year, and that as last year he will receive additional remuneration from a group of business men and friends of the high school. It is also known he will accept.

It is further unofficially known that the board has tendered a contract to Miss Thora Smith, well known teachers training course instructor in the high school for several years, as principal of the Jackson school, and has accepted; a position held by Miss Elizabeth Ferguson for several years past, and who prior to serving as principal of this building had been a teacher for years in the Medford schools.

Another unofficial report is that Principal Campbell of the high school has been tendered a contract, but it is not known whether he has accepted.

MAN WHO ABDUCTED GIRL IS FIRED UPON

GRANVILLE, Vt., April 30.—A man and girl believed to be Earl Woodward and Lucile Chatterton, abducted from her father's farm here last Friday, were located in East Brookfield today by one of the searchers. Both fled when the searcher fired at the man. Discovery of the pair was made by George Jerd, who was searching alone in the general vicinity of the farm from which cream had been stolen today. Jerd, who was armed only with a pistol, fired two shots, neither of which is believed to have taken effect. When the couple fled he ran to a general store in East Brookfield and telephoned for help.

On the Dan Hoye place, an abandoned farm, were found a camping outfit and provisions, abandoned by the man and girl when they ran from Jerd.
