

FLOGGING CASE UP FOR TRIAL IN LOUISIANA COURT

SHREVEPORT, La., April 30.—Arrangements were complete today for opening the trial of W. E. Miller, 40, and W. C. Oliver, 23, of Cedar Grove, a suburb, charged with assault and conspiracy in connection with the recent flogging of John Barker, 53, a Cedar Grove construction foreman.

Barker at the preliminary inquiry declared Miller and Oliver were among a group of men who lashed him from his home, carried him to a nearby woods and after shaking him to a tree, lashed him. He said the men told him they were going to take his daughter out and marry her. He added that one of the men in the group said:

"You don't control your family. You let your girl put on khaki pants and ride a bicycle. Every time anything goes wrong around your house you curse and raise sand."

Miller and Oliver, who are under \$1000 bail each, entered pleas of not guilty when arraigned. The case was set for trial at the home of Judge Crane. He received a letter from Mrs. J. C. Denman, of Franklinton, La., asking if the flogging victim is related to Raleigh Barker, also known as Raleigh Barker of Solano county, Cal., who the letter said, died recently and left a fortune.

Attorneys for his estate are seeking a John Barker in Louisiana, she said. Barker said he would try to find the family Bible which his mother had when she died several years ago in Tampa, Fla., and see if he could trace his relationship to the California man.

SOLICITOR GEN'L BECK RESIGNS

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Acceptance by President Coolidge of the resignation of Solicitor General Beck, expected to take effect at an early date, adds another prospective vacancy to four others already existing in important offices which are receiving the president's attention. In addition the executive also will be called upon soon to consider some re-appointments.

Mr. Beck is planning a trip to Europe in May. The other important vacancies now existing and to which appointments are expected shortly are in the offices of assistant secretary of state and assistant secretary of labor. A long standing vacancy exists also in the international joint commission.

Among the several terms of office soon to expire is that of B. E. Haney of the shipping board. He is a democratic member from Oregon and has been recommended for re-appointment by Senator McNary, republican, of that state.

BALLOON RACE TO START TOMORROW

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., April 30.—(By Associated Press.) Five balloonists of national and international reputation, two of them representing the army, will soar away from Rosencrans field here tomorrow in the national elimination balloon race.

A prize of \$1000, the Litchfield trophy and a place in the international events awaits the winner of the race. Every precaution is being made by the pilots and their aides to protect themselves against being marooned in Canadian wilds should the northeasterly winds predicted carry them that far.

W. T. Vanorman, winner last year and his aide, C. K. Wellman of Akron, Ohio, will carry provisions for two weeks, a shotgun and a highpower rifle in addition to radio equipment. The other balloon, that piloted by Lieutenant William J. Flood of the army, will carry a radio.

CONVICT STABS PAL TO DEATH

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., April 30.—Lawrence Mahach, an Indian boy, serving a term of 25 years for robbery in Humboldt county, was stabbed to death in a wash room of the jail at the state prison here today in a quarrel with Andreas Gomez, who is serving a sentence for carrying concealed weapons in Sacramento county.

George Miehling, a guard, was attracted by the Indian's outcry and fired three shots at Gomez in an attempt to shoot the knife out of his hand. One of the shots went thru the hand that the guard was aiming at and lodged in Gomez's leg. The men had been friends. Gomez refused to make a statement.

AMERICAN HOSPITAL OPENED IN RHEIMS

RHEIMS, France, April 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—The city of Rheims today entered into possession of a fully equipped hospital for children, the gift of the women of America. The building, the first of a group of hospitals planned for construction just outside the city, cost \$300,000, and there is an endowment fund of \$600,000, insuring its maintenance as a permanent record of the American women's desire to benefit Rheims and at the same time keep alive the memory of the Americans who fell on French soil.

The American ambassador, Myron T. Herrick, in handing over the building to the mayor, termed the hospital "a manifestation of the pride which the American women feel in the sublime role played by their French sisters throughout the war."

PORTLAND, Ore., April 30.—Lack of actual business at the Idaho sealed bid sale is interpreted by wool dealers here as emphasizing the weakness in the wool market. Buyers are inclined to go easy and are cautious about bidding on lots at too high a price. On the other hand, growers are inclined to hold rather than accept present levels.

Weakness in wool is reflected in the market for sheep pelts. Local hide buyers have reduced their country offers for flint dry and salted pelts. Best offers now on long dry pelts are around 21 cents or five cents a pound lower with short dry pelts bid at 11 cents, a decline of 1 1/2 cents a pound. Salted pelts are 25¢ to 50¢ lower at \$1.50 each for the long and 35¢ to 50¢ each for the short.

DEATH PURSUES BROOKLYN CLUB. M'KEEVER DIES

NEW YORK, April 30.—Edward J. McKeever, acting head of the Brooklyn baseball club of the National league, died at his home in Brooklyn yesterday, a little more than a week after the passing of the president of the organization, Charles E. Ebbetts. He was 66 years old.

Influenza developing from a cold contracted while attending the funeral of Mr. Ebbetts last Saturday was given as the cause of his death. Stephen McKeever, his brother, will assume the presidency, although he is 71 years old and is not expected to take active charge of affairs.

Provisions in the will of Mr. Ebbetts are expected to be made known some time late today. He owned a half interest, having sold fifty per cent of the stock to the McKeever brothers in 1912 when he conceived the plan of building a new stadium in Brooklyn.

The school board at Cascade Locks has decided to call an election to vote \$200,000 bonds for the building of a new high school for that locality. The bonds are to run for twenty years.

GIRLS THREATEN STRIKE AGAINST ROLLING UP HOSE

GLADSTONE, Mich., April 30.—Two hundred boy students of the high school were suspended yesterday when they protested against girl students being permitted to attend classes with their stockings rolled. Today the girls were threatening a "sympathetic" strike because they had been ordered to "roll 'em up."

The overt act that led directly to the boys' suspension was their refusal to wear neckties to school and their persistence in disregarding the dress regulations by turning down their collars. Superintendent Tongue said today that when they return the boys will be compelled to make up their school work without receiving credit for it. Also, they must wear neckties.

The students today paraded the streets of Gladstone and nearby villages bearing banners, drums and bugles.
