2000 DELEGATES EXPECTED I. O. O. F. MEET AT ASHLAND

ASHLAND, April 30.—More than 2000 delegates and visitors will attend the grand lodge sessions of the I. O. O. F. and Rebekahs, held in Ashland, May 18 to 21. The chairman of the general committee, Mrs. Louise Perout, says that the crying need just now is for more rooms. For 2000 is but a conservative estimate of the number of visitors to the city during convention week. The committee appreciate the cooperation of the lodges throughout the Rogue River valley in plans for making the convention a success, but the chairman states that more accommodations must be forthcoming; that Ashland does not realize the number of rooms needed. Anyone having rooms that may be used for visitors are to communicate with E. C. Payne, Mrs. Perout, William Meyer or any member of the house or general committees.

The close of the drive for increased membership in Ashland Post No. 14, American Legion, has resulted in the largest membership in its history—a total of 100, which is 75 above its quota. V. V. Mills and John Enders were captains of the teams in the membership drive, with John Enders' side winners, and expectant guests at a dinner given by the lodge in the near future. Initiation of the new members takes place May 12, with the Medford post in charge of ritualistic work. Commander Malone reported that 129 flag decorations outfits had been sold to Ashland merchants, thus insuring a uniform display, when the I. O. O. F. convention is in session May 18-21. Messrs. Enders, Bowers and Green were appointed to plan for a smoker in the near future; McGee, Woods and Tinker were appointed to plan for a baseball team. The Legion will cooperate with the G. A. R. on the Memorial Day program and E. A. Peters, Jr., Millard Grubb and G. H. Wenner were appointed to work with the G. A. R. on this program.

The forty-ninth session of the Rogue River association of Baptist churches opened Wednesday with 100 delegates present at the opening hour, which is a record attendance. Interesting sessions were held during the day and luncheon at the Hotel Ashland. Dinner is served by the Ashland church.

After a statement of present day conditions, four great causes were named: First, the breakdown of family religion; second, breakdown of regard for law—the disregard for law that people otherwise respectable show in traffic regulations, sympathy with law breakers; third, the movie, with a startling arraignment of facts to support the charge; fifth, the automobile, with all the opportunities it offers. As a prelude to the address it had been planned that the audience might have an opportunity to listen to a concert by Mr. and Mrs. Shearer, but through a mistake in churches, they did not appear until later—giving several beautiful numbers to the delight of those present at its close. The representative of the Chapel Car, told of his work in Oregon with many instances of special helpfulness in communities visited.

One of the pleasant happenings of the week was the delightful and complete surprise planned by the members of the Trinity Guild and their husbands for Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Looney, Wednesday evening at the hotel house, where their friends were assembled. Games and a social evening followed, during which Mrs. Looney
