It is almost impossible for an automobile traveler to run short of gasoline at a great distance from a service station these days, a check made by Sam Williams and son, Chester, between here and San Francisco shows.

They made a trip to the Bay region last week and on the day down counted 98 stations, or one to every 4.7 miles outside of incorporated towns. Between Grants Pass and Ashland they found 15 or one to every three miles. Between this city and Dunsmuir, 140 miles, there were 33, to Redding, a distance of 203 miles, 57 stations and to Williams, 365 miles, 77 stations.
