

3 N. Y. GUN MEN GO TO DEATH IN CHAIR, BRAVELY

OSSENING, N. Y., May 1.—Morris Diamond and Joseph Diamond, brothers and John Farina went to the electric chair at Sing Sing prison last night for the murder in Brooklyn of two bank messengers in 1923.

Morris, who entered the death chamber shortly after eleven o'clock was cool and composed. He made a brief statement of his innocence, asserting that he had not been given a fair trial and that he was "sorry for all" who had participated in it.

Joseph was led into the chamber after his brother's body had been removed. He showed no signs of the strain he had been reported to be suffering and in a few words declared his innocence.

Outwardly the calmest of them all, John Farina came last, smoking a cigar and approaching the chair without the slightest show of fear. He threw the cigar to the floor and began to pray as he sat down. His only message was: "I forgive everyone, and ask forgiveness in return."

At 11:40 o'clock Farina was pronounced dead and the triple execution was over.

ABDUCTOR AND LITTLE GIRL ARE CAUGHT IN BARN

RANDOLPH, Vt., May 1.—A German police dog today led three men to the barn of an abandoned farm in south Brookfield where they found Earl Woodward, farm hand and a former convict and eleven year old Lucille Chatterton, who left her home in Granville with Woodward a week ago.

Woodward was captured without resistance. The capture brought to an undramatic end a week's search by armed posses through the wooded mountain townships in which Woodward had been a fugitive since he took the child from the home of her father, Walter Chatterton, last Friday night.

Although armed with a rifle and with five cartridges left, the former convict quietly submitted to arrest. Lucille, her rescuers said, wept when they took her away, and protested that she was afraid to go home.

Woodward defended his action in taking her away by saying that the child was afraid of her father. They had been without food since yesterday morning, he said, when their supplies were seized by a posse which discovered one of their camping places. Their clothing was drenched from the heavy rains and both were suffering from chill and exposure.

Woodward said he had planned to take the girl to a place in New

Hampshire where she would be properly cared for. A crowd assembled about the inn when news spread that Woodward had been brought in, but there was no threat of violence.
