

MYSTERY CLEARED UP IN INDIANA MURDER TANGLE

GARY, Ind., May 1.—Identification of the girl whose mangled and burned body was found Sunday near Chesterton as Mrs. Josephine Desiderio, 21, Gary, was believed complete today by the authorities, after Mrs. Bernard Genero, her mother, and Sam Ross, a friend, were positive in recognizing her.

Ross, who said he had last seen the girl Friday in an automobile with another girl and two men, was held for questioning. He said he and the girl had resided in the same Gary hotel for two weeks since he came from New York.

Mrs. Desiderio had been separated from her husband who is sought by the police. Mrs. Genero, who was traced thru a telephone number scrawled on the lining of a vanity case found yesterday near the place where the body was discovered, was positive in the identity of the body as that of her daughter. She named Ross, who was found late last night and questioned this morning.

Ross, a foreigner, minutely described the appearance and clothing of Mrs. Desiderio, the police said, his story tallying with the bits of clothing and appearance of the body. Taken to the Chesterton morgue, he repeated his statements and said the body was that of the woman he had last seen Friday. He denied any knowledge of her whereabouts since then.

With the mystery of the name believed solved, authorities sought any connection between the death of the girl and the body of a man, identified as James Shela, Stockton, Ind., railroad employe, which was found yesterday on the outskirts of Gary. The man's throat had been seared and his trousers burned and apparently he had been dead since Sunday. It was recalled that a railroad employe's card was found Sunday beside the girl.

Efforts were made by the police today to develop information given by four Crown Point, Ind., persons, who said they saw two men carrying a struggling girl into an automobile while they were motoring last Sunday night. They attempted pursuit, they said, but lost sight of the automobile.

Notice is hereby given, that at the school district bond election hereby called to be held at the High school building, in Medford, Jackson county, Oregon, on May 5th, 1925, in and for said school district, between the hours of two o'clock p. m. and seven o'clock p. m., of said date, there will be submitted to the legal voters of said school district No. 49, the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness in the sum of One Hundred Eighty-five Thousand (\$185,000.00) Dollars, and to issue its negotiable coupon bonds in said sum bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a high school, or a unit thereof, in and for said district, and to purchase the real property necessary for said purpose.

The vote upon this question shall be by ballot upon which there shall be written the words: "Bonds—Yes" and "Bonds—no," and the voter shall place a cross (X) between the words: "Bonds—Yes," or between the words: "Bonds—No," which indicates his choice.

Polls for the reception of the ballots cast for or against the contraction of said indebtedness, will on said day and date, be open at the place aforesaid, and opened at the hour of two o'clock p. m., and will remain open until the hour of seven o'clock p. m., of said date, at which time the polls shall be closed.

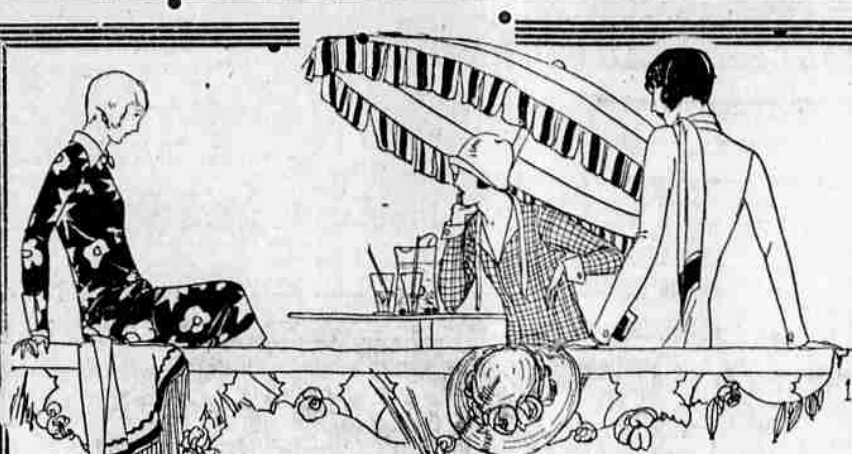

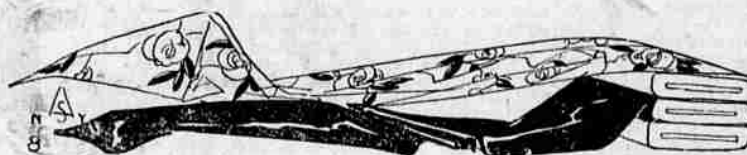
