

GRANTS PASS IS VICTORIOUS OVER LOCALS BY 11-10

Remounting clouds by both teams featured the Grants Pass-Medford Hi baseball game at the Climate City yesterday afternoon. By staging a ninth inning rally, Grants Pass won by a 11-10 score.

Medford tallied first, but was submerged by a 5-run batting orgy by the Grants Pass men and trailed along just behind their opponents until the end. The score was tied several times and in the ninth inning "Red" White, pinch-hitting for Boso, smacked out a single, stole second and third and came home on a passed ball, tying the count 10-10. In the last half of the frame, Lawrentz, Medford pitcher who relieved Schenel in the previous inning, walked the first man up and after he had reached third, a Texas leaguer brought him in with the winning run.

Schenel started on the mound for Medford, but was hit hard in the early innings and also later in the game. Every man on the Grants Pass team got a hit but Green, catcher, and he seemed to be hoodwinked by the left-handed hooks, fanning three times and sending weak flies to the infield. Harry Dunn, playing shortstop for the local team, fielded in spectacular style and was one of the few red and black hitters to find the delivery of the Grants Pass pitcher with ease. Chastain caught a fine game, stopping many a throw, that was ticketed for a wild pitch and holding the opposing team helpless when it came to stealing bases.

LUMBER INDUSTRY PRAISED BY HOOVER FOR PUBLIC SPIRIT

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Standardization of specifications covering lumber qualities and dimensions is a form of conservation to which ninety per cent of the business of the country has adopted. Secretary Hoover today told members of a special committee which assembled here today for its third annual meeting on the subject.

Better utilization of all the forests that are cut is being brought about, Mr. Hoover added, by the industry itself on a scientific practical and commercial basis.

Mr. Hoover said that an attempt would be made tomorrow in the organization of a national wood utilization committee to carry out the program of saving lumber even further.

"Here is one of the largest of our industries taking a leadership in the improvement of the most complex of technical and trade practices," Mr. Hoover said. "It has accomplished these ends by voluntary actions, not by extension of law. I am convinced that if your difficult problem can be fought out on this line you will have demonstrated our business problems can be solved better in public interest by industry itself than by government regulation."

HOPPIN RANCH HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE, BUT CONTENTS SAVED

The local fire department was summoned to the Fred Hoppin ranch two miles north of Jacksonville, at 3:20 p. m. Thursday, when the home of Mrs. Fred Hoppin caught fire due to a defective fireplace flue.

When the members of the fire department arrived at the scene with the chemical engine, the house, a frame bungalow, was too far gone to be saved, resulting in a complete loss. However, none of the household goods or other contents of the house were burned, as Mrs. Hoppin, who is planning to make a trip back east soon, had most of the household goods packed up, and they were easily removed from the burning structure.

NEW PHONE RATES IN EFFECT TODAY

Effective today, new telephone rates of the Home Telephone company became operative in Medford and Jackson county, as follows:

Individual line in business district, unlimited service, pays \$5 a month and \$4.00 on a two-party line, with a 25 cent additional charge for a desk set, \$1 for extension with or without bell.

The residence service charges are \$3 for an individual line; \$2.50 for two-party line; \$2 for four-party line, with 25 cents additional for desk sets.

The farmer line service rates are: Business, \$12 per year; residence, \$8.40.

Suburban service, ten party line rates for the business area are \$3.50 per month and \$2.50 per month for residence.

PRINCE DRIVES AN OX TEAM, GETS A RAZZ FROM GIRLS

CAPE TOWN, Union of South Africa, May 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Prince of Wales today drove an ox wagon through the streets of Cape town, accompanied by a procession of thousands of university students singing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow."

After this informal expedition the prince, following a scheduled program, was ceremoniously installed chancellor of the University of Capetown, a titular position he has occupied since the inauguration of the university in 1918.

Although the prince danced late last night with his untiring energy he was out early this morning and ran into a parade and demonstration of university students, including hundreds of girls, outside government house.

The parade was led by a body of comic cavalry, armed with brooms, followed by an old-fashioned prairie schooner drawn by 12 oxen. The cheering students were singing a special song with the chorus, "Oh, Edward, Now You're South in the Land of Drought, Don't Be Down in the Mouth!"

The prince greatly amused, entered into the spirit of the demonstration, mounted an ox wagon alone, flicked the oxen with the whip and led the procession through the city.

The students sang and cheered unceasingly and the prince seemed to be quite in his element.

The procession ended at the city hall, where the prince was formally installed chancellor of the university.

However, the festive spirit could not be entirely subdued and some "ragging" interrupted the ceremonies. At one point a white hen wearing the university colors was shoed on the stage by students.

The students carried around the hall an effigy of former Premier Ramsay MacDonald and sang some more songs composed in honor of the prince. One was a play upon the long list of Christian names the Prince of Wales can use if he chooses. This song had a refrain, "What will become of Alfred, Edward, Christian, George and Renfrew, Patrick, David when he leaves our shores. You'll have some tales to tell, no doubt—we hope you won't leave much of it out, Albert, Edward, Christian, George."

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SECOND ATTEMPT TO KILL KING OF BULGARIA FAILS

SOFIA, May 1.—(By Associated Press.) Another attempt to assassinate King Boris was frustrated today by officers of the guard who discovered an almost complete subterranean passage with an explosive fuse which they believed was intended to blow up the royal palace.

The organ of the peasants' party has published an emphatic denial that the party has been an accomplice in the recently attempted assassinations. The peasants' party condemns all similar criminal measures, the statement continued. According to the peasants' party journal all plots such as those upon the life of King Boris are instigated by persons financed from Moscow.

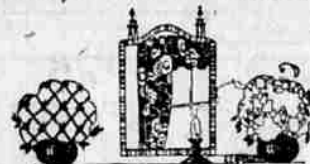
