## \$10,000,000 FOR OREGON THIS YEAR

### Senator Stanfield, On Arrival in Portland From Washington, Declares This State Will Get Large Sum From Uncle Sam in 1925—Campaign for Re-election Starts

PORTLAND, Ore., May 2.—United States Senator Robert N. Stanfield, who arrived here today from Washington, said that Oregon will receive almost \$10,000,000 for use in the present year as a result of appropriations made by congress at the last session. Among these he listed: Federal aid, highways, \$2,359,336; Forest roads and trails, \$1,587,953; Reclamation, \$2,621,000; Rivers and harbors, \$1,496,000; Improvements at Crater Lake \$39,700; Roads at Crater Lake \$183,000.

"In addition," he said, "congress authorized the construction of reclamation projects in Oregon totalling \$22,000,000 and also authorized the expenditure of \$180,000 on Tillamook bay, \$74,000 for dredging the shoals in the Siuslaw river and an annual maintenance of \$20,000 for this stream."

"Congress also authorized the survey and a report on the following projects: Yaquina bay and entrance; Port Orford harbor, Skipanon channel, Coos bay; Columbia river above and below Kalama with view to providing ship channel to wharves at Kalama and Lower Willamette and Columbia river from Tongue Point base at Astoria to the mouth of the river, the cost of these surveys to be paid out of a general fund provided for such purpose."

"Outstanding and shining above all other things accomplished in the new veterans' hospital to be constructed at Portland, at a cost of approximately \$1,350,000."

"These material results are due to the united efforts of the Oregon delegation in congress, coupled with the fact that the delegation is in complete accord with the president and the administration."

"I am very glad to get back to Oregon, I expect to remain in Portland most of the time until September when a special committee of which I have named, as chairman of the committee on public lands and surveys, will hold hearings in several of the western public land states."

"These hearings will probably continue until congress convenes in December."

"I hope to visit most parts of the state during the summer, that I may confer with the people in the various localities with reference to the improvement and development of our rivers and harbors, highways, national parks, Oregon caves, federal buildings desired and needed in several of the cities, and other things in which our people are vitally interested."

## DELICATESSEN WIFE, CAUSE FOR DIVORCE, SAYS WOMAN'S CLUB HEAD

BALTIMORE, Md., May 2.—A "delicatessen wife" in the opinion of Mrs. John D. Sherman, president of the General Federation of Women's clubs, is cause for divorce.

Speaking before the Maryland Federation of Women's clubs, Mrs. Sherman said she had no patience with women who enjoy themselves away from home and rush back at the last minute before the husband arrives to buy dinner at a delicatessen store.

"No wonder divorces have increased from one in every 30 marriages 25 years ago, to one in every five marriages now," Mrs. Sherman said.

Mrs. Sherman said the blame for the conduct of modern youth should rest on the parents and mentioned more honesty and fundamental religion as necessities in the home. She emphasized the "demoralizing effect on children of daily witnessing the violation of the law, especially the vice act, by their parents."

## Magnus Johnson Wins Libel Suit Against Magazine Publisher

MINNEAPOLIS, May 2.—A. N. Jacobs, publisher of a magazine in Minneapolis, today was found guilty on a charge of criminal libel in connection with the printing of a story charging former Senator Magnus Johnson with disorderly conduct.

The jury, however, recommended to Judge Frank M. Nye that leniency be shown in sentence. A stay of sentence for ten days was granted.

## 5 YOUNG WOMEN GIVEN MEDALS, CARNEGIE FUND

### Girls Take Place in Roll of Honor for Heroism in 1924—15 Awards in All—Over \$18,000 Paid Out By Commission.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—Fifteen heroic deeds brought recognition from the Carnegie hero fund commission at its spring meeting here late yesterday. The commission awarded bronze medals to the heroes, three of whom lost their lives; granted pensions aggregating \$2880 annually, gave \$10,000 for educational purposes and \$4500 for other worthy purposes. Five young women were recognized as heroines.

The heroes who went to their deaths while seeking to aid others were: Louis Joseph Pickens, Rochester, N. Y., drowned when he attempted to rescue a boy from Lake Ontario, July 17, 1924. The widow received a bronze medal and \$75 a month with \$5 additional for a son.

D. C. Carlyle Stephens, Washington, D. C., was drowned June 29, 1924, when he tried to rescue two girls from the Occoquan river at Occoquan, Va. A bronze medal with \$70 a month and \$5 for each of two children was awarded the widow.

Andrew C. Rowe, Parkersburg, W. Va., was drowned when he attempted to rescue a man at Vienna, W. Va., July 21, 1924. His widow received a bronze medal and \$75 a month with \$5 additional for a son.

The five young women who received bronze medals were: Helen E. Macon, 21, of Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, Md., attempted to rescue a girl from drowning at Venango, Pa., July 21, 1924.

Ruth Lytle Justice, 18, of Pittsburg, Pa., went to the aid of Miss Macon and the girl she sought to aid. She rescued both of them.

Esther R. Heard, 20, of Parkersburg, W. Va., saved a girl from drowning at Oxford, Ohio, November 3, 1921.

Elizabeth S. Wise, 15, of Baltimore, Md., saved a boy from drowning at Chester, Md., August 16, 1923.

Edna Mae Good, 15, of Bradford, Pa., saved two young women from drowning at Salamanca, N. Y., August 2, 1923.

The other heroes who received bronze medals were: Robert J. Royal of Uniontown, Pa., a negro miner, rescued a timber worker from a cave-in in a mine at Lamberton, Pa., July 12, 1923.

W. J. Bryan Bogart of Kirwin, Kas., rescued a fellow student from drowning at Kirwin, June 19, 1923.

Home R. Martz of Pittsburg, Pa., railroad fireman, saved an aged woman from being killed by a train at Cumberland, Md., June 1, 1924.

William V. Cagle of Baltimore, Md., a negro, saved a gas worker from being suffocated in a manhole at Baltimore, January 4, 1925.

James E. Rubie of Parkersburg, W. Va., attempted to save a man from drowning at Vienna, W. Va., July 21, 1924.

Lewis Spence Green, 9, of Morgan, Pa., a school boy, saved a small girl from being killed by an automobile at Morgan, December 5, 1923.

Elisha F. Scott of Columbus, Ohio, saved a man from drowning at Chesapeake, Ohio, June 24, 1924.

## RED ADMITS SOVIETS PAID FOR MURDER

### Former Custodian of Sofia Cathedral Where 160 People Were Killed, Testifies He Was Bribed By Communists—Hoped to Escape to Russia When Plot Failed.

BERLIN, May 2.—Dispatches from Sofia say that at the court martial trial today of persons accused of being responsible for the recent bombing outrages, Peter Zadzorski, formerly custodian of the Sveti Kral cathedral, confessed that he had been bribed by communists to co-operate in placing the bombs that killed 160 persons in that cathedral.

Zadzorski testified, the dispatches said, that communists had four thousand armed men in Sofia ready to attempt establishment of a revolutionary government before the cathedral explosion. He said he had hoped to escape to Russia after the plot failed.

Sofia dispatches give a revised list of the defendants in which the names differ considerably from those previously used. In addition to Zadzorski the new list names as the principal defendants Marco Friedmann, a lawyer; Colonel Koef and two men named Kamboulof and Daskalof.

SOFIA, May 2.—(By Associated Press.)—Traces of the communist conspiracy in Bulgaria have led to the Tcheropich monastery, 38 miles from Sofia where the authorities claim secret meetings were held.

The attorney general has ordered the arrest of the implicated monks.

## Casualties of the Air Service

BOSTON, May 2.—Lieutenant Alexander V. MacAulay, Massachusetts National Guard, whose airplane crashed when taking off for army and navy day maneuvers, died this afternoon at the East Boston relief station.

Lieutenant MacAulay, who was pilot of a National Guard plane with Private Angus D. MacPhee as mechanic, was caught in the wreckage of the machine when it struck the harbor mud flats. Physicians said his skull, jaw, leg, arm and other bones were fractured. MacPhee escaped with minor injuries.

Vanderbilt Yacht Scorching.

MAINESELES, France, May 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—Fire broke out today in the yacht Atlantic owned by General Cornelius Vanderbilt of New York and caused considerable damage necessitating several weeks' repairs.

The Atlantic has a distinguished record as a racing yacht and during the war was refitted and used as a sub chaser by the United States navy.

## Scores of Titled Mamas Seek Her as Rich Daughter-In-Law



At least one royal mamma, Queen Marie of Roumania, is seeking the Countess of Scaffeld, richest unmarried heiress in all Britain, as a daughter-in-law, and scores of mothers of lesser rank have entries in the race for her hand. She is 19. She inherited two vast estates from her father, the late Earl of Scaffeld, and an additional \$30,000,000 will come to her from the estate of Mrs. J. H. Townsend of New Zealand.

## HILL LINES TO BE EXTENDED TO KLAMATH FALLS

### Northern Pacific Directors Join With Great Northern and Officially Order Invasion of Southern Oregon—Connect With West Pacific.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 2.—Official action was taken yesterday in New York by the directors of the Northern Pacific Railway company toward extending the Oregon Trunk railway from Bend to Klamath Falls and on to a connection with the Western Pacific in northern California according to advice received by the Northern Pacific, the Oregon Trunk and the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway here late yesterday.

Already the Great Northern railway, through Ralph Budd, president, has declared its intention of invading the Klamath Falls region. Both the northern lines own the Spokane, Portland and Seattle system, one of whose subsidiaries is the Oregon Trunk, reaching from the Columbia river to Bend 150 miles.

News of the decision of the Northern Pacific to join with its ally, the Great Northern in invading the Klamath Falls region, was received through a telegram late yesterday from President Charles Connelly to A. D. Charlton, general passenger agent. The message from New York was to the effect that the directors by unanimous vote had authorized the Oregon Trunk to make application to the interstate commerce commission for a certificate of public convenience and necessity to permit construction of the new line.

The Northern Pacific directors also ordered that immediate definite location of the line be made, the message added.

The locations have been made for the southerly extension of the Oregon Trunk from Bend. One is to connect with the Southern Pacific's Eugene-Klamath Falls cut-off at Crescent, which would traverse the westerly border of the great pine timber tracts in that region, the other line would be through the easterly limits of this timber. It is said that the latter route is favored by the Northern Pacific-Great Northern executives. The distance from Bend to Klamath Falls is 147 miles by one location and 160 via another surveyed route, but if the northern lines are permitted to connect with the Southern Pacific's cut-off at Crescent and jointly use the cut-off to Klamath Falls the distance to build would be reduced to 85 miles. This question, raised by the Union Pacific, is pending before the interstate commerce commission.

To cost \$6,500,000.

The Oregon trunk extension from Bend to Klamath Falls will require an outlay of approximately \$6,500,000 and require 18 months to complete.

## Daily Report on the Crime Wave

OAKLAND, Cal., May 2.—Philip Medina, 33 of Fresno, was stabbed to death here today in a quarrel with Consuelo Robles, also of Fresno, believed to be a former fiancée. The police said that after the stabbing the girl boarded a stage with Stockton as her destination.

The police of that city have been asked to look for her.

A few days ago Medina was married to another girl, and the couple came here on their honeymoon. The Robles girl followed them from Fresno. When Medina stopped from his apartment to the street today Mrs. Robles confronted him. A violent quarrel followed. Medina's wife, who is nineteen, told the police that she had witnessed the stabbing affray from a window. Medina was stabbed through the heart.

SEATTLE, May 2.—After a desperate battle with a negro burglar, Mrs. Gertrude White, wife of the manager of a railroad contracting firm here, was beaten into unconsciousness and her fingers and wrists stripped of jewels valued at \$10,000, while her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Harold White, ran from the house to seek aid. The robber, who escaped, was described as about 33 years old.

The women, who were alone in the house, had just finished dinner on the lower floor and were going upstairs when they noticed the negro on the second floor. He motioned for the women to come toward him and as the elder Mrs. White stepped forward, overpowered her and fled.

## Accuse Pola Negri Trying to Bring in 16 Bottles of Wine

NEW YORK, May 2.—Pola Negri, Polish motion picture actress, has been asked to appear before the collector of the port here Monday to answer allegations that she attempted to smuggle 16 bottles of liquor into this country when she arrived last night on the steamship Berengaria, it was learned today.

## FRENCH ARMY ATTACKED ON A 60 MILE FRONT

### Morocco Tribesmen Start Drive On Fez With Large Forces—Many French Detachments Surrounded—Reinforcements Rushed.

FEZ, Morocco, May 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—Moroccan tribesmen operating under the orders of Abd-El-Krim, the rebel leader, are attacking the French zone over a front of 60 miles. At some points they have surrounded French posts where small detachments are defending themselves in blockhouses.

The French military authorities here are of the opinion that the rebel leader has a vast project in mind with Fez as the principal objective. The direction of the attacks thus far made by the tribes in their offensive indicates a plan for a converging movement upon this city.

There is no serious apprehension for the isolated posts, which are provided with machine guns and three-inch pieces.

With this equipment it is felt the garrisons should be able to keep the tribesmen at a distance.

The French forces in the zone of activity number about 15,000 men, divided into two columns each, commanded by a colonel. Reinforcements now on the way will bring the total to 20,000.

## B. F. MULKEY IS BEING BOOSTED FOR THE BENCH

SALEM, Ore., May 2.—A large number of telegrams were received at the office of Governor Pierce today urging him to appoint B. F. Mulkey, Portland attorney, as a successor to the late Judge George W. Stapleton of the circuit court in Multnomah county. It is said that Mulkey has not sought the appointment but that his friends are urging the governor to appoint him and urging Mr. Mulkey to accept it.

The argument is made that he has wide experience as an attorney, including experience as district attorney while living in Jackson county.

Newton McCoy, former public commissioner; Roscoe W. Hurst, W. T. Slater and several others are being urged upon the governor. McCoy and Hurst are democrats and Mulkey is a republican. In urging the appointment of Mulkey his friends argue that the appointment should not be a partisan one.

(B. F. Mulkey was formerly district attorney in Jackson county and is well known throughout southern Oregon.)

## THREE SHIPS SINK; 4TH HITS ROCKS

### North Atlantic Takes Heavy Toll of Property and Lives—25 Men On Steamer Azov Near Death—Seas Too High for Rescue—Schooner Turns Turtle.

HALIFAX, May 2.—The north Atlantic, heavily mantled with fog and lashed by a driving easterly wind and rain, has taken toll of five lives, two steamers and one three masted schooner since Thursday afternoon. The crew of one of the steamers at last reports still was in imminent danger.

The Nova Scotia schooner Cape d'Or went down Thursday night three minutes after being rammed by the steamer Clackamas off Sambro light-ship.

Mrs. Margaret Leone Wilkie, wife of the captain, and four of the crew, including the captain's brother, were drowned. Captain Wilkie and two other men were rescued.

Two steamers, the Azov, ashore on the southern Cape Breton coast, and the Moldogard, a Norwegian boat, ashore off Penant Point, were expected to be total losses. According to last reports, last night, both boats were being pounded to pieces by the high seas. The 25 men aboard the Azov managed to reach shore in their boats, but the crew of the Moldogard was unable to do this, and seas were running too high to permit the dominion government steamer Stanley, standing by, to approach. Hopes were held out that rescue might be effected today.

Captain Ralph McKenzie of the fishing schooner Archie F. McKenzie, reported last night that about eight miles south of the Liverpool automatic buoy he had sighted what he believed to be a schooner of about 300 tons bottom up and drifting shoreward. This, however, is believed to be the wreckage of the Cape d'Or, as no other vessels have been reported in distress.

The Moldogard was sighted by the Stanley early today off Shuben Island, east of the entrance of Halifax harbor. A wireless message to the department of marine fisheries stated that a lifeboat from the government steamer was rescuing the crew of the Norwegian boat.

## The Noted Dead

NEW YORK, May 2.—Word was received here of the death in Rome this morning of the most Rev. Louis Thelshilling, master general of the dominican order, and head of the order throughout the world. A cablegram announcing his death was received here by the Very Rev. Raymond Mesinger, provincial of the Dominicans in the eastern part of the United States.

## Wall Street Report

American Can touched 181 1/2 for a gain of 5 1/4 points. International Shoe soared ten points. United States Steel Iron Pipe five and Associated Drygoods, American Express, General Electric, Kresge, Baldwin, Chicago and Northwestern and Federal Light and Traction were among the many issues to sell two to four points above yesterday's final figures.

The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 750,000 shares.
