YANKEES SLIPPING, EVERETT SCOTT IS SLATED FOR BENCH

NEW YORK, May 2.—A new menace today threatens the playing record of the veteran Yankee shortstop, Everett Scott.

Victor over sickness, injury and transportation delays, of eleven years in the major leagues, Scott who has established a mark of playing in more than 1300 consecutive games, may be compelled soon to bow to further time.

With the New York team steadily slipping—they dropped another one yesterday to the tall end Boston Red Sox, 7 to 5—word emanated from the Yankee camp that Manager Huggins is seriously considering the replacement of Scott by young Wainwright, when the Yankees return to New York tomorrow to open a series with the Athletics.

Yankee followers point to the fact that Scott's work this year has evidenced unmistakable signs of slowing up in the field; his hitting has never been strong. Now 33 years old, Scott is beginning to show the effects of his long career at a period when the New York team can ill afford it.

GEORGE SISLER IS A BATTING FIEND, SAM HALE LEADS

CHICAGO, May 2.—(By the Associated Press).—George Sisler, pilot of the St. Louis Browns has started on a rampage of batting to fulfill his prediction that 1925 will be his greatest season in the American league.

The St. Louis star, completely recovered from impaired vision that dimmed his batting for two years, has collected one or more hits in every game since the season opened, giving him an average of .424.

Sammy Hale of the Athletics is leading the hitters with an average of .402, but he has played in only ten games, compared to 15 for Sisler, the runner-up.

The figures are based on averages including games of Wednesday.

Glenn Myatt, Cleveland catcher, has made four home runs for the leadership.

Veteran sluggers of the National league have deposed the newcomers who traced the spotlight during the first week of the season.

Zach Wheat, star outfielder for the Brooklyn Dodgers, by cracking out 16 hits in six games boosted his average of .333 to .462 and today is setting at the head of the procession.

Jimmy Bottomley of the Cardinals is threatening the Dodger veteran with .442. Rogers Hornsby, of the Cardinals, is .424 batter.

He is gradually climbing to the top of the list. He is in third place, with .432, a gain of 16 points over a week ago.

Gabby Hartnett, peppery catcher of the Chicago Cubs, is holding the honors in three departments. He has scored 15 times, is leading in total base hitting with 44 and is in "A" class of the league in hitting homers, having smashed out seven.

MISS COLLET WINS OVER MEN GOLFERS BRITISH TOURNEY

STOKE POGES, England, May 2.—(By the Associated Press).—Miss Glenna Collet, former American woman golf champion, defeated Cyril Tolley, former British amateur champion, by one up in a match over the Stoke Poges course this afternoon.

Miss Collet made a strong finish, pulling out a victory after she had been two down with three to go.

It was the first opportunity the experts have had to see a direct comparison between the games of Miss Collet and Miss Wethered.

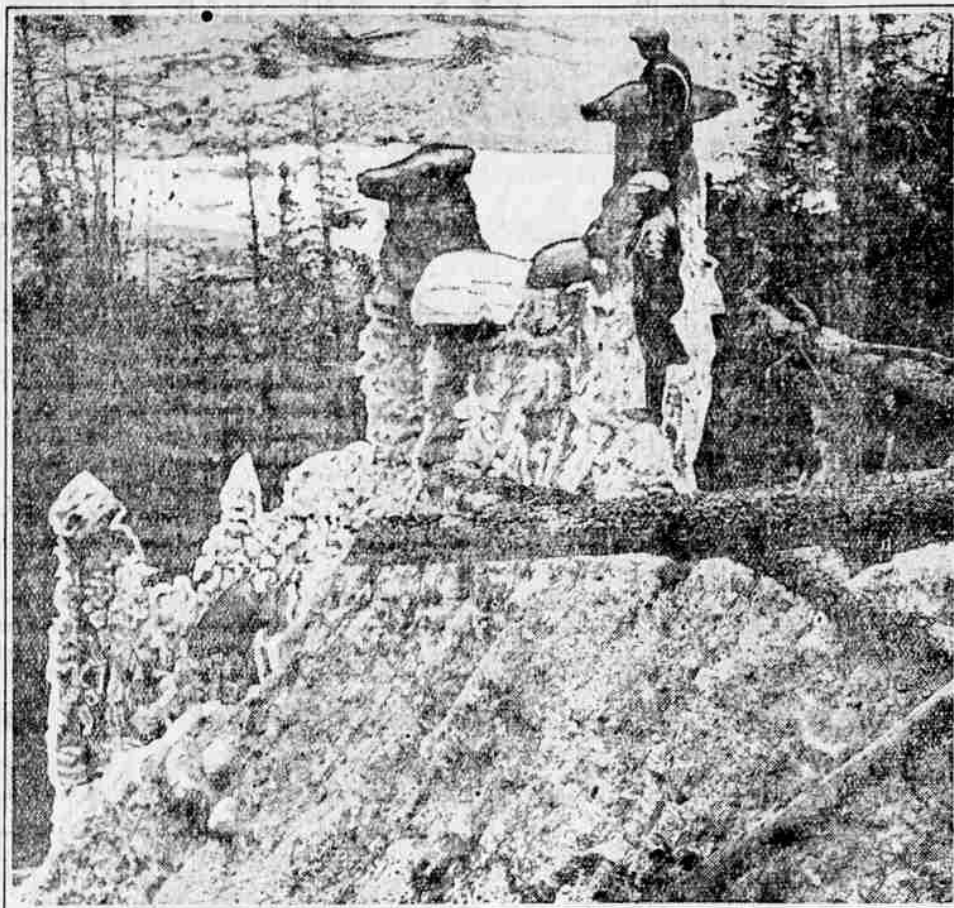
Miss Collet played well except for her putting at the start, which was timid, but on the eighteen hole she sank an eighteen-footer to win the match for her side.

WHERE A MISSTEP MIGHT MEAN DEATH.



THE Hoodoos on the Cavell Motor Highway, Jasper National Park, curious stone figures brought into being by the erosion of the earth under the constant wearing effects of air and water, draw exclamations of wonder from thousands of tourists who visit the largest of Canada's National Parks every year.

Huge flat stones, balanced as hats, atop the pinnacles of earth which have stood up firmly when the mountain side all around them crumbled or was washed away by the rushing waters, seem as though

the slightest breath of wind would be sufficient to send them hurtling to the bottom of the valley hundreds of feet below. A favorite sport with the tourist is to drop large stones on the hoodoos and see them sway back and forth drunkenly, yet finally regain their poise and remain balanced as firmly as before.

The tourist in the photograph who was bold enough to scramble down and use one of the flat stones for a table on which to rest his arms, had a strenuous climb be-

fore he again regained the level surface of the Cavell Highway, which winds up from the Athabasca Valley almost to the foot of the glacier of the Ghost, that peculiar age-old formation of ice and snow which hangs on the wide stretches of Mount Edith Cavell.

Visitors to Jasper Park Lodge may travel by motor or saddle horse from the Lodge to the foot of Mount Cavell or any of the other mountains surrounding the log cabin hostelry of the Canadian National Railways.

ATTORNEY DROPS MANN ACT CASE ON CLIENT'S NOTE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 2.—An attempt by Horace Greeley Wilson of Roseburg, former Indian agent at Klamath Falls to obtain another postponement of his trial on a charge of violating the Mann act failed today when United States District Judge C. E. Wolverton announced that the trial would start May 13. Wilson, who is in the cell, had written a letter to Judge Wolverton asking for a postponement until next November, stating that he needed time to get witnesses from eastern states.

Deputy United States District Attorney J. O. Stearns opposed the request, stating that two postponements had already been made and that the government was ready to proceed with the trial.

Wilson's attorney, Robert F. McGuire said he would withdraw from the case inasmuch as Wilson had made the application for further delay directly to the court.

ESTATE STARTED IN BEER WHEELBARROW NOW OVER \$2,000,000

PORTLAND, Ore., May 2.—A \$2,225,000 estate that was born in a wheelbarrow was divided among the heirs of Henry Weinhard, pioneer brewer today.

The big brewery plant and the property that came from its profits were shared by the Weesenger and Wagner families.

Henry Weinhard started the core of the estate many years ago in Vancouver by performing all the duties of the manufacturing, the sales and the delivery departments of a one-man brewery.

He made the beer himself. He sold the beer himself.

With a wheelbarrow he delivered the beer himself.

The plant, now a manufactory of soft drinks, goes to Mrs. Paul Weesenger, a daughter, who gets approximately five-eighths of the estate. Weesenger for many years has been manager of the plant and of the estate.

Three-eighths, totalling about \$1,000,000 in value goes to Henry Wagner, a son-in-law and his son, Henry Weinhard Wagner.

Henry Wagner was the husband of Louise Weinhard-Wagner, daughter of the late brewer. She is dead.

IRON HINDENBURG STATUE SOLD FOR 1 MARK NOW RUIN

BERLIN, May 2.—The "Iron Hindenburg," the gigantic wooden statue into which patriotic Germans hammered nails at so much a nail during the raising of war funds—has succumbed to an ignoble fate; it now develops.

After the revolution the directors of the Tiergarten where the 110 foot statue was erected, requested its removal. The patriotic society which was responsible for its erection, was unable to furnish the funds for moving it away and the Tiergarten authorities then offered it to any museum willing to pay transportation charges, but there were no takers.

A Berlin architect finally bought the statue for one gold mark, sold the body as old wood and removed the head to a storage house, intending later to present it to some public body as a historic relic.

During the Kapp revolt special police guards were stationed around the storage house to protect the head.

But the architect's negotiations with the patriotic societies were dragged out so long that fungus growths destroyed what remained of the famous statue.

CANNERIES WIN FULL DECREE IN PACKERS CASE

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Denying the government's request for a limitation of the order suspending operations of the packer consent decree, Justice Bailey, in the supreme court of the District of Columbia, today entered a formal order suspending the decree "in every particular."

The order entered today is to remain effective until further order of the court, which, it was stipulated, will be entered, if at all, only after a final hearing and proof of the government's original case filed in 1920.

Government counsel sought to obtain a modification of the suspension decree so that it would effect only the operations of the packers with the California canneries and would be effective only until 1929, when the contract between those parties would expire.

Under the decree entered into five years ago the so-called "big five" group of Chicago meat packing companies agreed to divorce themselves from unrelated lines of business.

The California co-operative canneries later were permitted to intervene in the case at interest because of the contracts under which their product was distributed by the packers.

On April 23 Justice Bailey announced that on the showing of the canneries, he was convinced that the decree was working an injury to that industry. The supreme court declined, however, to expand his decision to an order to vacate the decree, "since no proof has been shown that it was entered properly."

GARY MURDER IS STILL A MYSTERY, 5 MEN ARRESTED

GARY, Ind., May 2.—Five men were held here and in Chicago today in connection with the mystery of the burned and maimed body of a young woman found Sunday near here. But questioning them failed to pierce materially the blank wall against which investigators found themselves after a week of effort.

The belief, at first positive, that the woman was Mrs. Josephine Desiderio, 21 year old mother of three children, which wavered yesterday was further shaken today when James A. Brown, Fort Wayne, Ind., said the body resembled his missing niece, Mrs. Mabel Wahls Miller, 23.

Brown, with Samuel Jackson, Allen county, Indiana, prosecutor, and Samuel Immel, Fort Wayne, deputy sheriff, caused the detention in Chicago of Ellsworth C. Miller, husband of Brown's niece. The uncle told the police that Miller and his wife were married two years ago in Cedar Rapids, Iowa and that there frequently was trouble between them.

Six weeks ago, Brown said, Miller and his wife visited Brown in Fort Wayne, and later left. From then until last Monday, Brown said, he had not heard from them. Then he was told by Miller that his wife had been missing since April 6 and that he had gone to Columbus, Ohio, in search of her, believing she had been drowned there. Brown said the Columbus police told him no woman had been drowned there.

Mrs. Miller, Brown told the police, had worn shoes similar to the one found near the body. Miller admitted he and his wife had quarrelled and said she had threatened to shoot him. He told questioners she had left Chicago April 6 in an automobile to go to Fort Wayne and he had not heard from her since.

Three other men taken in Chicago were Fred and Harry Desiderio, brothers of Louis Desiderio, husband of Josephine, and Claude A. Perini, their cousin. They were brought here for questioning. They denied knowing the whereabouts of the husband, who is sought by the police, and said they had opposed his marriage to the girl.

Also held in Gary was Samuel Ross, who added his identification of the body as that of Mrs. Desiderio to the recognition made by her parents today and Mrs. Bernardo Genero, of Gary. Their identifications, however, were discounted after William J. Smurdon, a Gary constable said he had talked to Mrs. Desiderio last Tuesday, three days after the body was found. A. J. Halter, Gary attorney for Mrs. Desiderio at one time, and his stenographer, asserted positively that the body was not that of Mrs. Desiderio.

BURGHUFF FAVORS CLOSING UP FISHING

PORTLAND, Ore., May 2.—Closing of the Willamette river to commercial fishing is advocated by Captain A. E. Burghuff, state game warden, in his monthly report to the game commission.

This could only be permanently effected, Burghuff states, through constitutional amendment setting the river aside to remain forever a trolling and seed stream, thus barring any succeeding legislature from throwing the river open to commercial fishing.
