DEVISE NEW RULES FOR QUALIFYING IN NAT'L GOLF TOURNEY

NEW YORK, May 4.—Solution of the problems attending the remarkable growth of golf in America apparently have only begun for the United States Golf association. Temporary measures have been adopted for the restriction of the field in the national amateur championship, the most drastic of which was the reduction in the number of qualifiers from 32 to 16. Officials of the association will meet Thursday to revise plans for handling the record entry of 271 in the sectional qualifying round of the open championship at Lido.

One solution to be considered provides for half of the field playing eighteen holes the first day and the other half the following day, all players within eighteen strokes of the low score to continue the eighteen hole round Friday. Total scores for the 36 holes would be counted.

Another suggested plan would require that the field be divided into three parts, each to play 36 holes within three days.

That the cut in the qualifying division of the amateur championship is almost certain to find some of the nation's best linkmen eliminated from the match is indicated by records of previous tournaments.

HAWAIIAN POLO PONIES BURNED

HONOLULU, May 4.—(By Associated Press.) All but one of the Hawaiian string of polo ponies which recently returned from play in California were burned to death in a fire last night at the Baldwin stables, island of Maui. Word of the fire was relayed to Honolulu by Al Castle, a member of the Hawaiian team, who said the loss included a number of ponies recently purchased on the Pacific coast by island players. The Baldwin string numbered some of the finest mounts available in America. Details as to the origin of the fire were not available here.

SEPPALA WINS DOG DERBY AT NOME

NOME, Alaska, May 4.—(By Associated Press.) Leonard Seppala won the John Borden marathon dog race yesterday from a field of five starters in two hours, six minutes, twelve seconds. The course was twenty-six miles, 300 yards long. Ed Rohn finished second in two hours, twelve minutes, two seconds. James Kennan was third. The two other starters were Frank Dufresne and Ollie Weaver.

Great rivalry existed between Seppala and Rohn as both men participated in a dog team relay race which carried anti-toxin from Nome to Nome when Nome was stricken with diphtheria in January and February. Zero weather prevailed today with a calm frosty fog.

Local Mining News

Play Fair.
All honest business is conducted on fairness—fairness to one's self—fairness to those with whom one deals, and fairness to the public. Unfair methods, which sometimes temporarily succeed, always have their drawback, and the attempted development of any section of the country based on such methods will be abortive.

With the pronounced progress made in the development of the potential mineral wealth of southwestern Oregon, it is not amiss to apply the rule of fairness to the mining industry if we are to ultimately secure that development warranted by the vast bodies of minerals found here. Such development must be necessarily dependent on large capital to succeed, and large capital can only be secured by the coming to the district of the experienced mining men from other fields.

When they come, they are now doing they should be treated fairly and encouraged in every way to become interested in our development. They expect nothing short of such a policy, hence any other policy will fail miserably. Experienced mining men know what they want and what they are entitled to and are willing to deal on the basis of fairness, both with themselves and those with whom they come in contact. They know what fairness is, know it is the only policy to pursue, and insist on it from others. They do not belong to the sucker class who leap before they look, therefore, any deal put up to them to receive their consideration must be on the level and open to a thorough investigation. It is a waste of time on the part of all parties to attempt any other course.

While the majority of mine and prospect owners are absolutely honest and play only on a fair basis, that much cannot be said of a certain class who do not own mining property but who depend on securing favorable options from the owners and attempt to dispose of same to prospective buyers. Such work is legitimate only to the extent that they attempt to make a fair deal; it is abortive and vicious any other way.

Only last week an engineer representing a mining company operating in an adjoining state came to southwestern Oregon to investigate the feasibility of transferring their major operations to this section. Everywhere he was met with outlandish propositions, one in particular being a certain property at \$150,000 that the crowd who held the options were to pay less than \$25,000 for. Was that proposition fair? It was not considered so by the engineer who informed the bureau that he had about decided to give up his quest in this district.

Another case in point is one where the owner of a certain property told an agent orally that if he would sell it for \$20,000 he would pay him a 10 per cent commission. The agent found a prospective purchaser and took him to the property. The buyer liked the property, but said nothing. The following day he returned to the property without the agent and talked with the owner, frankly telling him that he liked the property and asking what the deal was with the agent. When informed that the owner's price was but \$20,000, with a 10 per cent commission, to the agent, he told the owner that he would gladly have paid that price for the property and added another 10 per cent for the agent. Being surprised at the statement the owner asked what price the agent offered the property and was told \$30,000. Was that fair? The prospective buyer did not so consider it, and declined to have anything to do with the matter.

Southwestern Oregon must get away from such tactics to succeed in its development program. No one but a sucker would bite on a proposition like those cited, and sucker money never yet developed a section, and never will.

One who performs a service is entitled to a fair compensation, but one who attempts holdings of this kind should be denounced by all fair minded mining men. The mine and prospect owner should be careful in giving out options on his property to insure a fair deal to all concerned, and all mining men should discourage any attempt to thwart the development of our vast mineral resources by unfair business methods.

NEWSPAPER MAN ALBANIA ENVOY

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Charles C. Hart, Washington correspondent for the Portland Oregonian and a number of other western newspapers, has been appointed minister to Albania to fill a long-existing vacancy. Formal announcement of the appointment is withheld pending approval by the Albanian government. Mr. Hart is a native of Indiana, 47 years old and has had wide newspaper experience in the middle and far west. He was secretary and manager of the national republican progressive league seeking the election of Charles E. Hughes in 1916.

Maintain Oregon's Highways

Destruction Must Be Repaired

It Costs Millions Each Year To Maintain Our Highways



CAUSE AND EFFECT

The Highway Commission finds 90% of the damage is caused by 4% of the traffic. This 4% includes for-hire trucks and busses operating as common carriers for their private gain.

The last Legislature passed a law requiring these for-hire busses and trucks to pay a moderate charge to reimburse the State and Counties in part only for the damage these heavy busses and trucks are doing to the highway. Whether this law becomes effective May 28, 1925, rests with the people.

The Motor Bus and Freight Truck Associations are circulating referendum petitions to hold up this law until November, 1926. If the people sign these referendum petitions, the private car owners and the general taxpayer will continue to pay the tremendous cost of maintaining these highways without receiving substantial help or aid from these for-hire trucks and busses that are doing most of the damage.

When you are asked to sign one of these petitions remember that it is a commercial bus or truck company that is asking you to relieve them of paying for the great damage that they are doing to our roads.

Refuse to sign these petitions and advise your neighbors to do the same.
