

16 NEW SETTLERS REPORT TO LAND DEPT. OF C. OF C.

Tabulated results for the month of April show positive results from the efforts of the Land Settlement department of the Medford Chamber of Commerce. During April 16 new settlers reported to the land settlement department. Three hundred thirty-seven signed questionnaires were received, of which 286 stated they were coming to Oregon during 1925 with capital investment of \$761,959.

Arthur Foster, manager of the southern Oregon division of the land settlement department who just returned from an official visit to California points reports to Secretary Boyd of the local chamber that the influx of land and homeseekers that will be in here this season will so far surpasses the much heralded "Old Boom Days" that Medford people will talk the period of 1925 from now on. Continuing, Mr. Foster says: "It seems that everybody in California are casting their eyes toward southern Oregon and they all seem to have heard of the season's wonderful rainfall, the tremendous load of fruit on the trees, and the extremely healthful financial condition of the farmers and businessmen." Mr. Foster also consented to outline the details of his work at the local chamber's big open forum Tuesday evening, at 6:30 in the Hotel Medford.

We find now that so many boys are coming and the time is so short that we have to make this appeal to the citizens of Medford to help the local boys in providing the necessary housing accommodations. We expect some two hundred boys in addition to the regular delegates and there are ninety-six of those. The additional ones make up the patrol, drum corps and bands. We have to provide rooms for Friday and Saturday nights and breakfast for Saturday and Sunday morning. These visitors who are depending on our good hospitality are young men between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one, coming from twenty-four Oregon cities. They will soon enter our commercial, social, educational, industrial, professional and other channels of activities in Oregon, and the impression we as citizens of Medford make on them at this time, will be remembered as long as they live. This is an opportunity for us to show our hospitality.

ready has been accomplished. It involves considerations which are more or less intangible; it involves, in particular, a changed attitude of mind, for what the war destroyed was not only human lives, dreadful as was the toll, nor property, nor the forces of government. It destroyed for the moment belief in one another's good faith, and good faith is the cement

There is a Limit

"We know wholly the natural unrest and resentment which these unhappy conditions create and foster. And that knowledge naturally enough has taught us to look upon the aftermath of the war in Europe sympathetically and with an honest desire to help. But—we too, are a practical people. When we lent our savings to make it possible for the peoples of Central Europe to get to work, it was because we knew that only in this way could Europe as a whole be made to function economically. When we lent our savings to rebuild the markets which had been destroyed, it was because we knew that in no other way could they again be enjoyed. That was necessary in the beginning; that was mere common sense. If we went at the job with a certain moral earnestness that was part of the obligation."

"It is natural for us to assume that those who have suffered so much from war should seek a settlement which, so far as is humanly possible, should be free from conditions leading directly to war. It is in this spirit we have helped. But we have never forgotten that there was a limit beyond which we could not go. "The full measure of American helpfulness can be obtained only when the American people are assured that the time for destructive methods and policies has passed and that the time for peaceful upbuilding has come. They are asking themselves if that time has in fact arrived. And that question they cannot today answer. The answer must be given to them. It must come from the peoples of Europe, who alone can make the decision."

Good Faith Demanded
"If the answer to peace then you may be sure that America will help to its generous utmost. If—which God forbid—that answer shall continue confused and doubtful, then I fear that those helpful processes which are now in motion must inevitably cease."

"We are not as a people interested in making speculative advances. We can undertake to help only those who try to help themselves. And, in saying this, we are not thinking specifically of any one nation, but rather of a situation in which all are alike involved. "Now with the working out of that problem in its details, the American people will have no will or desire to meddle. They recognize that into it factors enter with which they are only indirectly concerned. Their geographical position alone frees them from considerations which other nations must regard. They offer no advice. But I may say to you that they hope and that they fervently pray that a peace may soon be reached—not a peace of mere truce and arrangement, based primarily on force, for that would merely be the prelude to another war, but a peace which contains the elements of permanency—a peace which will deserve and receive the moral support of mankind because it is just. "And they believe that such a peace can come in only one way. It must be based upon the assumption of good faith by all who participate in it."
