The forest conservation measures prohibiting throwing of lighted cigarettes, cigars or other burning material from moving vehicles, and also restricting brush burning during the period of fire hazard in California was signed by Governor Richardson on Monday. It also prohibits the burning of brush, slash, brush or grass without a written permit from the state forester between May 15 and October 31.

crucious spitting. A person with a communicable disease expectorates promiscuously, the sputum which contains disease germs dries and the germs are transferred to others with the dust.

Every year in the United States 150,000 people die and between one and two million are incapacitated by tuberculosis. A recent survey by the Jackson County Health unit, showed eighty deaths in Jackson county in the last five years from tuberculosis and 43 known active cases during the last year. Some of these cases would have been saved if everyone would consider his duty to society and help safeguard others by refraining from promiscuous spitting.

Forest Fire Buckets Received in Medford

Five man-pack water cans, for use in fighting fire, were received Monday at the local forest service office. These five-gallon cans are shaped and fitted with straps, suitable for packing on a man's back, and equipped with hose and air pressure pump so that the water may be thrown some distance.

H. B. Rankin, supervisor of the Crater National forest, states that this equipment will be especially useful for putting out fire in snags which throw sparks over the fire line and which sometimes burn for weeks after the fire is controlled if no means of extinguishing the fire with water is available.
