The first revival topic to be delivered on Main street tomorrow night will be "The Prophetic Age or God's Chosen People, the next sermon will be on the Ark of the Covenant, the third the Creative Week, and the fourth Lost and Restored, and the last Popular Amusements With the Lid Off."

CHICAGO, May 5. — Mrs. Stella Costigan Carson of Linden, Iowa, testified today before the coroner that Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock "was hardly dead," before Mrs. William D. Shepherd had removed a diamond from the dead woman's finger. Mrs. Carson attended Mrs. McClintock during her last illness 16 years ago.

Judge Harry Olson has announced that he is seeking to show that the deaths of Mrs. McClintock, her son William, who died last December, and Judge Olson's brother, Dr. Oscar Olson, who died five years ago, are part of a conspiracy to obtain the McClintock fortune. William D. Shepherd is charged with murdering young McClintock.

HINDU HEALER IS ARRESTED AFTER A HOTEL GUN PLAY

SEATTLE, May 5.—Shots were exchanged in a hotel room here early today when department of justice agents arrested "Colonel" Dinahian P. Ghadiali, a healer, who represented himself as a former commander of the New York police reserve air service. Other than that he had been sought more than four years, no reason was given for his detention.

Officers declared they found Ghadiali's baggage packed and a railroad ticket to Philadelphia among his effects.

Receiving no response to their knocking the agents opened Ghadiali's door and were greeted with a shot, the bullet lodging in a wall. The shot was returned with equally poor marksmanship, after which the healer was overpowered and disarmed.

PORTLAND, May 5.—Colonel Ghadiali is wanted by department of justice agents in Portland, they admitted today, but did not disclose on what charge.

Ghadiali registered at a hotel here last Thursday and checked out Saturday. On Thursday and Friday nights, officers said, he held "curing seances," to which invitations had arrived.

Ghadiali claims to be a Parsee, and to have taken out first citizenship papers, according to Immigration Commissioner R. P. Bonham.

SECY. AGRICULTURE TO VISIT OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5.—Secretary William M. Jardine of the department of agriculture will spend not less than two days in Portland and environs on his proposed trip to the Pacific coast according to a telegram received Friday from United States Senator McNary by the chamber of commerce.

In all probability he will be here June 26 and 27.
Details of his itinerary in Oregon are being arranged by his brother Dean James Jardine in charge of the experimental station of Oregon Agricultural college.

SALEM, Ore., May 5.—Millon A. Miller of Portland will leave Thursday or Friday of this week for New York City where he will represent Oregon at a national child welfare conference to meet May 15 to 20 at the Commodore Hotel. Miller is chairman of the child welfare commission of Oregon.

CONSCIENCE HURTS, DEFAULTER GIVES UP TO THE POLICE

DETROIT, May 5.—George D. Komar, 33, walked into a police station here today and asked to be arrested for the theft of \$10,000 from the City of Maplewood, Mo., a St. Louis suburb, of which for eight years, he was treasurer. The money, he said, had been lost at the gambling tables. Komar said he left Maplewood two weeks ago.

"No one there knows where I am," he said, "but I couldn't go on. My conscience wouldn't let me. I want to go back and face the music."

Komar is a bachelor.

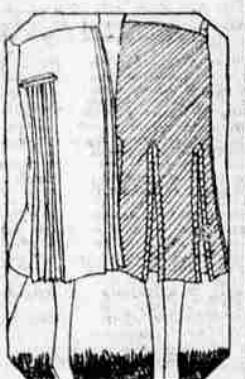
