

AGUINALDO URGES COUNTRYMEN TO SUPPORT U. S. GOVT.

MANILA, May 6.—(By Associated Press.) General Emilio Aguinaldo, president of the Veterans of the Philippine revolution, addressing members of that organization at Baguio, Luzon Island today urged the members to support Governor General Wood and his administration.

General Aguinaldo declared that the veterans organization was not only one of a political nature, but pointed out that it should work for the national unity which, he said, was now threatened by political bickering and lack of co-operation.

The general referred to the American flag as the greatest symbol of liberty in the world, saying:

"When the time comes, the United States will grant you freedom but that time has not yet arrived."

RACE TOLERANCE IS KEYNOTE OF COOLIDGE TALK

WASHINGTON, May 6.—To go forward on the same "broadening lines," that have marked its development thus far, with its emphasis on equal opportunity and treatment for all its people, must be the nation's aim, President Coolidge declared in an address here Sunday at the laying of the cornerstone of the Jewish community center.

Made up of so many diverse elements, the president said, the nation, in steering its future course, "must cling to those fundamentals that have been tried and proved as buttresses of national solidarity."

From whatever part of the world the Jewish community of the United States has drawn for its increase, the president continued, "its members have always been 'eager to adapt themselves to our institutions,' and to take 'their full part as citizens in building and sustaining the nation.'"

Louis Marshall of New York, who spoke after the president, defended the Jewish race against charges of "internationalism," made by Professor Philip Marshall Brown of Princeton, at a recent meeting of the American Society of International Law.

GOVERNMENT TO TRY AGAIN FOR OIL INDICTMENT

WASHINGTON, May 6.—With the summoning of a panel for the selection of a special grand jury here today, Atlee Pomerene and Owen J. Roberts, special government counsel in the oil cases, were expected to arrive to prepare for later appearance before the jury in re-opening alleged criminal phases of the leasing of the naval oil reserves.

The government counsel already has appealed from the decision of the district supreme court a month ago dismissing the criminal indictments returned last June against Albert B. Fall, former interior secretary and Harry F. Sinclair, Edward L. Doheny and his son, Edward L. Doheny, oil operators.

The new grand jury proceedings has been decided upon as a recourse in the matter.

The first indictment was dismissed because of the presence in the grand jury room of an assistant to the attorney general. It was said the same list of witnesses would be called in the new proceedings as appeared in that which appeared in the indictments.

Additional evidence was presented by the government counsel before a special grand jury here last month, but it adjourned without taking action.

PORTLAND ATTY. IS NAMED JUDGE BY GOV. PIERCE

SALEM, Ore., May 6.—John H. Stevenson of Portland has been appointed by Governor Pierce as a circuit judge for the fourth judicial district to succeed the late Judge George W. Stapleton, whose death occurred last Friday. Under the law Judge Stevenson will hold office until his successor is elected and qualified by the general election of November, 1926.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—John H. Stevenson came to Portland in the early 1900's. He became associated with the Evening Telegram as a cub reporter, served later as court house reporter and then became political reporter and feature writer.

He studied law and in 1907 was appointed deputy district attorney. He served for one year and resigned to enter private practice. In 1923 he was appointed municipal judge by Mayor Albee. He introduced several innovations, among them a morals court designed to keep the morbidly curious from sitting in at trials.

Stevenson was born in Forest Grove, December 28, 1878. His father, Robert O. Stevenson was once state game warden.

Debs Speaks to Great Crowd Madison Square Call Police Reserves

NEW YORK, May 6.—Two hundred police were called out to handle a crowd of 10,000 men and women jammed in the streets around Madison Square after 15,000 others had crowded into the building to hear Eugene V. Debs and others speak at the opening of the workmen's circle national convention Sunday.

In the rear of the garden the police had difficulty in making a lane thru the crowd for a group of children who paraded at the convention hall. The crowd was demonstrative but orderly.

SWATTING BEE NEARLY FATAL TO MOTORIST

LOS ANGELES, May 6.—A buzzing bee narrowly escaped serious injury on the highway near here yesterday when George Campbell, about whose head it was buzzing, took both hands off the steering wheel of his car and swatted with might and main. At the hospital after the crash they told Campbell his broken leg would mend in a few weeks.

STATE HIGHWAY COM. ROASTED BY POLK CO. JUDGE

SALEM, Ore., May 6.—An attack on the state highway commission and its methods of expending money for highways in the state was made recently by eGeorge Hawkins, Polk county judge, speaking before the Salem chamber of commerce at its weekly luncheon here. He charged that millions have been wasted in road expenditures by the commission.

"It isn't the American idea of democracy and justice," said Judge Hawkins.

He stated that voters of the state are not careful enough of the legislators selected to represent them in the state legislature.

"We have too many tinkers and not enough thinkers," he declared.

The judge charged that under the present system of expending money bridges on highways in the state cost three times as much as they would cost if money were expended under direct belief that when the people of the state begin to consider the proposition seriously they will not tolerate a state commission.

"I admit the county court has made mistakes," he concluded, "but for God's sake look at the highway commission."

Governor Pierce was present at the luncheon.

BOOTLEGGER HITS AUTOMOBILE, MAKES ESCAPE TO CANADA

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—B. E. Youmans, Portland attorney, his wife and his mother, Mrs. Edith O. Whittlessey, 61, are in a hospital here suffering from injuries received Monday when the car in which they were riding was hit head on near Sherwood by a car driven by William Robinson, whom the police describe as a bootlegger. Youmans is in a serious condition. Robinson is in a hospital with a broken left arm and broken jaw.

According to accounts received by traffic officers Robinson was driving at a mile a minute rate when his car swerved and hit Youmans' car near Sherwood, on the Capitol highway. A companion of Robinson dumped a large quantity of illicit liquor from the car after the crash, drew a revolver and forced the driver of a bread truck to carry him back toward Sherwood. He later disappeared and was reported to have fled toward British Columbia.

WOMEN GOLFERS START TOURNEY IN ENGLAND, MAY 18

LONDON, May 6.—Ninety-four competitors are entered for the British women's open golf championship tournament, beginning at Troon on May 18 and the draw which was announced today shows that there will be strong challenge for the title by overseas players. Miss Glenna Collett, Miss M. O'Gorman, Miss H. Ellison and Miss M. Hunnewell will represent the United States. Miss K. C. Allen is a Canadian entry, while Miss C. Lascelles and Miss Ruth Affleck will play for Australia. There are several entries from Ireland.

In the top half of the draw which is the most difficult, Miss Joyce Wethered, the holder of the championship, probably will meet Miss Collett in the third round and the survivor afterward will face the opposition of such players as Miss Doris Chambers, Miss Fowler, Mrs. Temple Bothell, Miss Hunnewell, Miss Gourlay and Mrs. Cantley. In the easier lower half, Miss Cecil Leith must overcome Mrs. Gavin, Miss Gladys Bastin, Miss Joan Stocker and Miss Mathell Wragg before reaching the finals.
