

NEW 'HI' SCHOOL BONDS PASS BY BIG MAJORITY

There was much rejoicing all over the city last night and today over the fact that at last, after years of agitation and effort, Medford is to have a new high school.

This was decided at yesterday afternoon's special election when the question of issuing \$185,000 in bonds to purchase a site and construct the first unit of a new high school was overwhelmingly passed by the taxpayers and other qualified voters, by 675 yes votes to 158 no votes, a decision in favor of the bonds of a little over 4 to 1. This vote, as had been predicted, was record breaking for a school election of property owners.

Tonight at 8 o'clock at the high school the student body and their parents will celebrate the bond victory.

The next step in bringing about the new high school will be the choosing of a site by all the qualified voters of the city at a special election, Friday, May 15, from two locations submitted by the school board, the so-called P. & E. grounds on the east side and the Holly street grounds on the west side.

Hardly had the votes been counted last night when the campaign was formally on for the site election, in which so much interest has already been shown and which is expected to be augmented from day to day, that by far the largest vote ever cast at a special school election will probably be counted the evening of May 15.

The bond election of yesterday passed off without a single hitch from the time the polls opened at 2 p. m., at the high school until they closed at 7 p. m. The augmented election board of exceptional ability and experience worked so fast that there was no congestion at the polls whatever, except at the very opening.

This board consisted of the following: Mrs. Nina Wall Colvig, Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick, Mrs. H. M. Platt and Messrs. Martin McDonald, Lee Garlock, C. T. Stewart and George Hewitt. The votes had been counted within an hour after the election closed. Only two ballots of the \$25 cast were thrown out by the board, one of which was a sample ballot and the other a wrongly marked one.

The exact question submitted to the voters was as follows:

"Shall School District No. 43, of Jackson County, Oregon, issue its negotiable interest bearing coupon bonds in the sum of one hundred eighty-five thousand (\$185,000.00) dollars, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of providing funds to construct and equip a new high school building, or unit thereof, in and for said school district, and to purchase real property necessary for said purpose?"

In rejoicing over the victory of the bond election for a new high school, the students of the high school are putting on an evening of exceptional entertainment, tonight at 8 o'clock.

At eight o'clock the Dramatic club will start the ball rolling with a comedy on family life entitled "Thursday Night." This will undoubtedly be one of the best and most amusing plays ever presented by the high school Dramatic club. The Dramatic club is composed of the best talent in school, Hawthshaw included.

Following this, the high school band will give a concert. Too much praise cannot be given the band for the music they are able to render.

Now comes the "sizzle," the craziest, funniest, go-gettingest thing ever produced by the local branch of higher learning. A prize is being offered for the best and most original sort of entertainment in the style of a carnival. All of classes and organizations are taking part. There is bound to be some good ones.

A small admission will be charged for the play and concert. The carnival will be conducted on the five and ten cent basis. An evening of more balanced entertainment is not to be found.

The parents, school board, and townspeople are cordially invited to assist the high school in their celebration.

FRENCH FORCES HARD PRESSED

Fighting between the Riffians and the French is reported to be increasing in severity but the present engagements are believed to be but a prelude to greater conflicts which will develop as Abd-el-Krim throws more men across the neutral zone separating the Spanish and French protectorates.

The French are said to have been successful thus far, being aided by native contingents in the French area, and advisors here say the Riffians have been driven back into their own country in some places.

French aviators have done effective work in bombing the tribesmen from entrenched positions and inflicting severe punishment by means of machine gun fire from low altitudes.

Earthquakes in Far East
MANILA, May 6.—(By Associated Press.) Weather bureau dispatches received here today from the island of Negros reported that various points in the Pampanga, Mindanao and Negros islands were rocked by heavy earthquake shocks last night. No damage was reported. The origin of the tremors was said to have been in the Mindanao sea.

CHICAGO, May 6.—Wheat went soaring in price today. May delivery flashed upward to \$1.68 a bushel in the first hour of trading; an overnight skyrocketing of six cents. Word that the Spanish government had bought more than two million bushels in a single transaction furnished the immediate impetus for the bulge in sales.

KELSO MAYOR IS ARRESTED FOR HAND BILL CIRCULATION

KELSO, Wash., May 6.—Mayor A. Rurib Todd was arrested today on a warrant charging criminal libel, issued on information filed by Prosecuting Attorney Hite Innes. The charges were based on a hand bill circulated to advertise a meeting called by Mayor Todd. The handbill was alleged to have made damaging references to certain of the mayor's opponents in his controversy with the city council.

The warrant was issued late yesterday but service was delayed. It was said, to permit Mayor Todd to attend a council meeting last night.

When the council convened last night the chamber was packed with spectators. A resolution adopted at the Todd meeting which called for resignation of six councilmen and the city attorney was read by Fred Ravenson, but no official action was taken. Bond for Mayor Todd was set at \$750.

Deputy Sheriffs Ed Hull and Clarence Dunbar, who made the arrest, said that when they went to serve the warrant the mayor met them at the door with a curse and at first refused to go with them. The officers stepped into the house, and a few minutes later the mayor accompanied them to the sheriff's office.

PREFERS AUTOMOBILE TO THE POOR HOUSE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 6.—Inmates of the Franklin county poor house may not have automobiles. It was ruled today by the county authorities. The ruling resulted from the case of W. F. Crawford, 69, who recently was ordered admitted to the institution. When he arrived here yesterday in his automobile, Superintendent Bahitt advised him that he would have to sell his car and apply the proceeds upon his board and lodgings. This Crawford refused to do, appealing to the board of county commissioners. The latter were obdurate, also, so Crawford withdrew his patronage from the infirmary.

NEW YORK, May 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Everett Scott, veteran shortstop of the New York Giants, broke his long stretch of playing in consecutive games today when he failed to appear in the opening lineup when the Yankees faced the Athletics at the Yankee stadium. Previous to today Scott had appeared in 1307 consecutive games, starting his string when he was with the Boston Red Sox, June 29, 1914. The veteran shortstop complained of pains in his legs and manager Huggins sent "Pewee" Paul Wamlinger, the 29 year old recruit from the Augusta club of the South Atlantic league to the shortstop position.

DETROIT, May 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—A record that has been engraved upon the books since the mighty Honus Wagner laid aside his bat and glove was erased at St. Louis yesterday and another written by Ty Cobb when he brought his life time number of extra bases on hits to 1456. The previous mark held by the flying Dutchman of the old Pittsburgh Pirates was 1448. Up to yesterday Cobb was two short of Wagner's mark. His batting field day of three home runs, a double and two singles, however, added 10 more extra bases to his total. Cobb also equaled an American League record by making four extra base hits in a nine inning game.

EMPEROR OF ALL THE INCAS ORDERED TO PAY ALIMONY

NEW YORK, May 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Inca Tito Gussel, who says he is the 11th emperor of all the Incas, today was ordered to pay \$12 weekly alimony, that his wife might clothe, feed and provide shelter for herself. Magistrate Oberwager refrained from placing him under bond because "it would be a shame to ask royalty to furnish a surety."

The wife knows her husband as Alberto V. Roselle. She told the court she didn't think much of the king business, so far as her husband was concerned, and preferred that he should get a job as an electrician. This was his work when she married him in 1923, she said, after having met him in the Park Avenue Baptist church.

MANY WOUNDED IN ATTEMPT TO ROB BANK IN RUSSIA

MOSCOW, May 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—A number of citizens were wounded, it was revealed today, when details became available of an attempted bank robbery in a Moscow suburb yesterday. One bandit was killed and the other five were captured.

The bandits entered a branch of the State Bank, drew revolvers, and forced about 100 tellers and clerks to lie on the floor while two robbers ransacked the coffers. One clerk who escaped gave an alarm and militia responded. The bandits attempted to escape and a free for all street fight followed.

Many shots were exchanged. Pedestrians became panic stricken and some were wounded.

WASHINGTON STATE TO PLAY OREGON TODAY

EUGENE, Ore., May 6.—Fresh from their 6 to 3 victory over the University of Washington baseball team at Seattle yesterday the Washington State College Cougars arrived in Eugene for the game today with the University of Oregon nine.

Since their drubbing at the hands of the Idaho Vandals here Monday, the Oregon team has gone into practice with a grim determination. Harrison reputed to be one of the best Oregon hurlers is again eligible to play and will probably be called upon to show his wares against the heavy hitting Cougars this afternoon.

JACK DEMPSEY SAILS FOR TRIP IN EUROPE

NEW YORK, May 6.—Sailing on the Beregarra with his wife today for a five weeks trip to England and France, Jack Dempsey reiterated his assertion that he had no intention of retiring from the ring. He explained that his trip was to be a honeymoon and not for the purpose of promoting his pugilistic career.

Asked whom he regarded as the most formidable heavyweight boxers, Dempsey reflected a moment and then said: "Tunney, Gibbons and Willis."

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES ON NORMAL SCHOOL MEASURE

SALEM, Ore., May 6.—In an opinion today Attorney General Van Winkle holds that the new training school for the normal school at Monmouth can be legally located at Independence as provided by the 1925 legislature and for which an appropriation of \$125,000 was made. The opinion holds that the constitutional amendment of 1908 providing that all state institutions must be in the county where the seat of government is located unless otherwise voted by the people would not inhibit construction of the building at Independence for the reason that it is part of the Monmouth normal school and the normal school was located at Monmouth by vote of the people.

The opinion holds that the word "at" is a term of relativity and the law locating the normal school at Monmouth may mean in or near that place, and the supreme court is quoted as authority. It is pointed out that prior to the 1908 amendment the constitution provided that state institutions must be "at" seat of government, but this was never construed as inhibiting them from being located several miles away from the city of Salem.

State Treasurer Kay at a meeting of the board of control several months ago raised the question whether the training school could be legally located at Independence and Secretary of State Roger put the question up to the attorney general.

In effect, the opinion holds that although the new building will be in Independence it is under the law "at" Monmouth.

The new school will at the same time serve Independence for regular school purposes and serve the state normal school as a training school for teachers.

POSSE CONTINUES TO SEARCH FOR CONVICTS

COLFAX, Cal., May 6.—A posse of 50 men continued the search in this vicinity today for two bandits believed to be Joe Tanko and Floyd Ha', murderers who escaped from San Quentin prison.

Officers expressed their firm belief that the two men who robbed and commandeered a United States mail truck yesterday were the convicts, who since their escape are said to have killed a merchant in Sacramento and shot a policeman there a few days later.
