CHILD'S ABDUCTOR PROVES TO BE SON LOST 20 YRS. AGO

BROCKTON, Mass., May 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Earl Woodward, ex-convict and kidnapper of 11-year-old Lucile Chatterton of Granville, Vt., will find a home here with the mother he has not known since infancy, when he is free from the toils of the law, it was declared today by Mrs. Jennie Woodward Sturtevant, who says she is convinced that Woodward is her long lost son. Information contained in a letter Mrs. Sturtevant received from the prisoner confirmed her belief that she has found her missing child.

She is confident that Woodward will be acquitted when he is tried next week at Middlebury, Vt., and will join her here. Simon Sturtevant, whom she married in 1901 and who heard only recently that she had been a mother previously, expressed willingness to have Woodward join the family circle.

The Sturtevants have five children, two of them married.

In his letter written in pencil on letter paper of the Addison county sheriff's office, Woodward said that when two years old, his mother, Jennie Woodward, had left him in the care of Mrs. Elizabeth McIntyre of Braintree, Vt., who had brought him up.

U. S. CHIEF OF AIR SERVICE FOUND

NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 7.—(By Associated Press.) Major General Mason M. Patrick, chief of the army air service, "lost" since five o'clock yesterday afternoon, flew safely into Nashville shortly before eight o'clock this morning. It had been his purpose to fly from Memphis to this city without a stop, but darkness overtook him at Eva, a village without telegraph facilities, where the night was spent. Captain St. Clair Street accompanied the general as a pilot.

General Patrick said no difficulty was experienced in landing at Eva and that the flight was resumed at dawn.

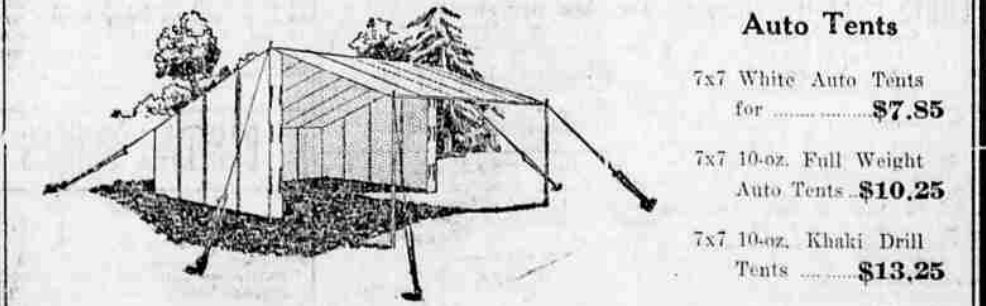
