

LOCAL POLICEMAN SHOOTS 3 TIMES WHEN COOK FLEES

W. A. Fulton, well appearing local restaurant cook who blandly admitted in Judge Taylor's court today that he is an exceptionally fine fellow when sober, also stated that he cannot get quietly lubricated without such occurrence being accompanied by untoward and costly trimmings.

It seems that some time ago after having worked steadily for months cooking at Copco for the power company he quit work and with his \$700 savings came to Medford for a much needed reunion with moonshine, and when he recovered all his money was with him to Chief of Police Adams' gone.

Then late last night he accidentally came across the liquid that cheers in the shape of a small quart bottle of booze that a stranger he met on the street, sold him for \$2, and part of which he parked in his stomach, after which he made the acquaintance of Night Officer Leggett, didn't like his looks, refused to go to prison with him, and dolberly walked away from him, causing that patient officer to shoot three times in the air on Sixth street in an unsuccessful effort to frighten him. The shots, however, nearly scared to death the Hotel Holland, guests and other sleeping citizens nearby.

Judge Taylor had an exceptionally soft heart today in court, and hence after an impromptu discussion with Fulton on the merits of the prohibition laws, fined him \$25, to be served out in the county jail at \$2 a day unless friends come to his rescue and pay the fine.

It seems that Fulton forgot all his usual gentlemanly instincts after visiting a local restaurant where he tried to touch the night cashier to sleep, finally giving it up as a hopeless job, and going into the Nash Hotel lobby to fall asleep in a chair.

When Officer Leggett, who is one of the hardest boiled policemen alive in a fight and yet without is possessed of much diplomacy, and common sense, awakened Fulton, the latter was abusive, but was finally coaxed to accompany him to the city prison. En route Fulton decided he wouldn't go and resisted by pushing the policeman away. Leggett, desiring to beat his prisoner up, persuaded him to go with him to Chief of Police Adams' house on North Fir near Sixth street to talk the matter over.

While they were waiting out in front of Adams' house about 3 a. m., waiting for the chief to dress, the befuddled Mr. Fulton decided that he didn't want to play any longer and hurriedly walked away with Officer Leggett still desiring to use force on a "funny" drunk, in pursuit.

Then it was that the policeman fired the three shots, which so excited the downtown district. Fulton did not stop, however. This morning he was found by Leggett on the street, still befuddled, and wondering how the school bonds came to have such a large majority.

LOCAL MINISTER TO ADMINISTER ESTATE

ARABS ATTACK JEWS RESULT OF ELECTION

PARIS, May 7.—(Jewish Telegraph Agency).—Two Jews were killed and 60 others injured at Oran, Algeria, as a result of the municipal elections there yesterday. The victorious anti-semitic majority led by arabs, marched down to the Jewish district, shouting "down with the Jews!" and attacking every Jew they met on the way. Troops quelled the riots.

Varmint Killing Declines.
April showed a decided falling off in the slaughter of coyotes and wildcats in this county, in comparison with the first three months of the year. Last month 36 coyotes and 11 wildcats fell the dust, about one-third of the previous month's destruction. The bounty fees for the month were \$239.

APRIL RAINFALL ABOVE AVERAGE, SIX CLEAR DAYS

April had much more rain than that month has had for years past. According to the official weather report just issued for that month, during which 1.88 inches fell. This was the largest amount of April rain in this section of the valley since the year 1913 when the amount was 2.45 inches.

Thirteen days of this month had .01 or more precipitation. 21 days were cloudy, three were partly cloudy and only six days were clear. The largest amount of rain to fall in any one day was .42 of an inch on the 15th.

Much of the year was warm for that time of year, with a mean maximum of 64.2, and a maximum of 86 on the 25th. The coldest temperature of the month was 29 on the 1st. The mean minimum was 40.56 and the mean 52.38. There were no so-called killing frosts, thunderstorms, or hail, and there was no snow.

The weather at Crater Lake national park for April was much colder, with almost record breaking snow and rain, according to the observations taken in that high altitude by the park ranger. The precipitation amounted to 3.78 inches, and the total snowfall for the month was 41.8 inches.

At the end of April there was 117 inches of snow on the ground, whereas the amount of snow on the ground April 15 was 97 inches. Fifteen days of the month were clear, 13 days were cloudy and two partly cloudy. The Crater National park mean for April was 34.94. The maximum was 76 on the 23rd, 27th and 29th, and the minimum was 10 on the 25th. The greatest daily range was 55.

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JACKSONVILLE HAS A MERRY FEUD OVER U. S. A. HOTEL

Under the caption, "Truth Must Be Told," in the last issue of the Jacksonville Post, what Former Sheriff Charley Terrell describes as "a mob-kill in a tenpenny," has been given to the public. The main characters in the disturbance are the "Native Daughters of Jacksonville," and George A. Gardner, former county judge, and president of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce.

The Native Daughters, it seems were promised two rooms in the U. S. Hotel, as a meeting place and for exhibiting the Chamber of Commerce specifying the rooms. This was satisfactory to all concerned, apparently, but when the Native Daughters conferred with President Gardner, he informed them that "some dissatisfaction had been expressed, and discouraged them from carrying out their plans." The Native Daughters took this as a personal insult, and moved into the Brunner building, donated to them by Mrs. Alice A. Sargent.

Then the Post says: "Mr. Gardner informed us the morning after the eventful C. of C. meeting that if the Native Daughters moved into the building, he and the Ficks would quit. (If Mrs. Fick lives up to her reputation in this town, the Post will need an old-fashioned fighting editor when this paper comes out.)

"The question is: Are the people of this community worthy to be trodden upon by two men at the instigation of an envious, jealous-hearted woman?"

Discussing the solution of the problem, the Post continues: "The only way out of the situation is to elect a man who is capable of properly conducting a meeting, who does not cater to a clique who have only their own interests at heart, and whose only way of accomplishing a thing is to tread everyone underfoot; who does not make a suggestion; who does not listen to the prattings of an envious, jealous-hearted individual who finds satisfaction in poisoning the minds of new comers and trying to break down every attempt at co-operation. This is the same spirit which showed itself at the last city election when an attempt was made to mislead the people in regard to the handling of city funds. The same outfit that suggested the Post was a 'poor thing to tie to.' It may be, but its purpose is to help in everything for the common good and not to be used as a tool for a would-be politician."

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WHEELER'S CLIENT FOUND GUILTY IN OIL CASE TRIAL

GREAT FALLS, Mont., May 7.—(By the Associated Press).—Gordon Campbell was sentenced to two years in Leavenworth, Kan., federal penitentiary and to pay a fine of one thousand dollars by Judge George M. Bourquin after he was found guilty by a jury in federal district court here this morning of using the mails to defraud and fraudulent oil promotion. He was found guilty of the sixth count in the indictment, which alleged conspiracy.

Mr. Campbell employed United States Senator H. K. Wheeler of this state as his attorney at \$10,000 a year following the latter's election to the senate in 1922. Senator Wheeler last month was acquitted by a federal jury here of a charge of having represented Mr. Campbell before the interior department after his election.

The jury reached its verdict in the Campbell case at 5:30 last night after having deliberated 29 hours, and it was opened in court at 10 a. m. today.

Campbell is under indictment in the District of Columbia jointly with Senator Wheeler and E. S. Booth, former solicitor of the interior department, charged with conspiracy to procure federal land by fraud.

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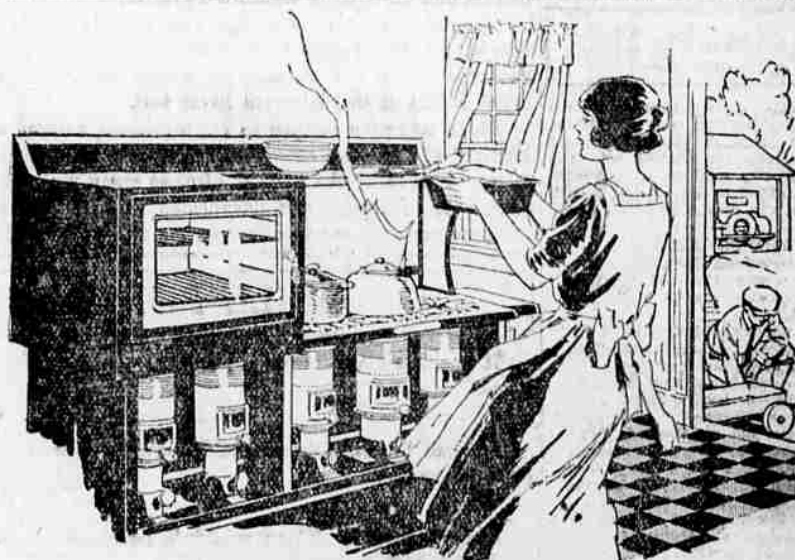


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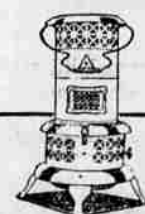
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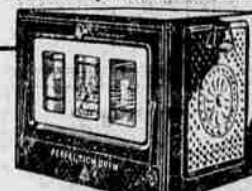
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
