

PORTLAND HINDU CLAIMS DESCENT FROM KING CYRUS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 7.—Dinshah P. Ghadiali, who was arrested in Seattle Tuesday, was brought here early today from Seattle to await action by a federal grand jury that he had violated federal statutes by traveling with his private secretary, Miss Geraldine McCann, a Portland girl.

Ghadiali declined to discuss the charges against him, beyond saying that he was the victim of a frame up. In an interview he declared he is a full fledged American citizen, having taken out his final Americanization papers in Hackensack.

"Please say I am a Parsee," he asked. "Because you might as well call me a negro as a Hindu. I was born of Zoroastrian parents in Bombay, India, November 28, 1873. My people are descendants of King Cyrus of Persia."

He said his American wife, a New Jersey girl, is at Malaga, N. J., with their six months old son. A twenty year old girl, the daughter of his Parsee wife, is also at Malaga, he said. His Parsee wife, he declared, deserted him in 1912, and went away with a Hindu doctor.

Ghadiali claims to have the rank of colonel in the New York flying police corps. He said he was commissioned a captain in the police reserves by Commissioner Rodman W. Wamsamaker in 1913, and that the next year he was appointed governor of the New York police aviation school. He said he took the first airplane mail from New York to Philadelphia.

He reviewed the activities of his life, saying he had been electrical engineer in Indiana and had been engaged in temperance work. After coming to America he was interested in a variety of enterprises. He said "spectrochrome therapy" on which he has been lecturing, is a method for treating disease by color waves.

G. MADDOX OUGHT TO ENTER THIS MEET

SALEM, Ore., May 8.—For the first time in ten years Salem is to be the center of a big checker tournament, according to announcement made by Isadore Greenbaum, Salem's champion checker player, when on May 15, teams from Salem, Eugene and Albany, constituting the tri-state playing contingent of the Willamette valley will meet a team of players from the Portland Chess and Checker club. The tournament will be purely a checker affair, with no chess games scheduled.

Forty of the fastest checker players in Oregon will tangle wits on this occasion at the chamber of commerce, the tourney to start at eight o'clock in the evening and will be open to the public.

PRINCE OF WALES TO PAY CHILI VISIT

LONDON, May 8.—(By Associated Press.) The Prince of Wales, it is officially announced has definitely accepted an invitation to visit Chile upon the termination of his visit to Argentina.

The date has not been fixed for the visit but it is said the prince will arrive in Chile about August 20 by special train from Buenos Aires.

H. M. S. Repulse, on which the prince is making his southern voyage, arrived several days ago at Capetown and the royal traveler now is enjoying the hospitality of the South African Union.

It is understood that the prince will spend several days in Santiago, Chile, and then make a thorough tour of that country. He will embark from a Chilean port for his return to England.
