

CLAIM GERMAN U BOATS AID RIFFIANS

PARIS PUTS CENSORSHIP ON MOROCCO

Premier Painleve Declares the Press Is Going Too Far and Too Fast—Spain Asked for Assistance to Prevent the Escape of Foe Into Spanish Territory.

TANGIER, May 12.—(A. P.)—A report to the Havas agency says a German submarine recently landed explosives, telephonic material and foodstuffs on the coast of Riff, the chief town of which, Abd-el-Krim, is invading the French zone of Morocco. It is also stated that several Germans dressed as Riffians and using Oriental pseudonyms have been observed on the Riff.

PARIS, May 12.—(A. P.)—A censorship has been established of French and of foreign agencies and newspapers dealing with the Moroccan operations, it was announced today.

The decision to establish the censorship on news from Morocco was reached during a cabinet meeting today at the conclusion of which Premier Painleve said:

"The French and foreign press have gone too fast and too far. We wish to bring the Moroccan operations back to their real importance."

PARIS, May 12.—(A. P.)—France is asking Spain for authority to bombard or attack the concentrations in Spanish Morocco of the Riffian tribesmen now engaged in an invasion of the French zone. The Spanish are further asked to stop the provisioning of Abd-el-Krim, the Riffian leader, through the port of Aoudia.

These requests are being made in the form of "conversations," although there is no great confidence here in the results to be expected, the French feel that they are entitled to some help from Spain in the present situation, as they say they are placed at a great disadvantage in repelling the Riffian invasion through the ability of the tribesmen to make all preparations for attack while safely on the Spanish side of the border.

Native Leader Is Active.
PARIS, May 12.—(A. P.)—Abd-el-Krim continues to consolidate the positions held by his Riffian tribesmen in northern French Morocco, notably in the regions of Djebel Rhane and Kifirane and the task of revivifying the French advance points is effected only in the teeth of growing resistance.

According to reports through native channels still larger forces are being gathered in other parts of the Riff to reinforce the western part of the invaders' front. French reinforcements, however, are arriving faster than the Riffians and when Abd-el-Krim launches his offensive, military men say, he will find the French well prepared to deal with him.

Native Moroccan troops under French officers were used yesterday in a forward movement looking to consolidation of the French front opposite Abd-el-Krim's concentrations. The objective was reached without an engagement, according to official reports.

The French air service has been able to get a general idea of the Riffian concentrations, but respect for Spanish territory has prevented them from bombing these points, a measure which might completely disorganize the army.

French Cigarettes Loaded; Smokers Are Given Instructions

PARIS, May 12.—"Smoke carefully, holding the cigarette at arms length between puffs," is the warning issued by the tobacco monopoly in consequence of the recent series of minor explosions which has injured about a dozen persons who were smoking government-made cigarettes. The police are completely mystified as to who is "loading" the tobacco. Some smokers are taking to foreign cigarettes while others are "rolling their own."

VON HINDENBURG IS INAUGURATED WITHOUT A HITCH

Ex-Field Marshal Takes Oath of Office As President of German Republic Amid General Enthusiasm—Crowds Sing Deutschland Uber Alles.

BERLIN, May 12.—(By Associated Press.)—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg was inaugurated president of Germany today.

Except for a brief shout of protest from the communists, the inauguration was carried out according to schedule, the field marshal being sworn into office by Reichstag President Paul Loebe before a crowded house.

The oath taken by the president was as follows:

"In the name of the Almighty, All-Knowing God, I swear to devote all my energies to the welfare of the German people, to increase their prosperity, to protect them from injury, to preserve the constitution and laws of the commonwealth, to perform my duties conscientiously and to deal justly with all."

To this he added the religious affirmation, "So help me, God," thereby setting a new precedent for German presidents.

Herr Loebe addressed the field marshal briefly, expressing the hope that during his administration the reconstruction of Germany which had been begun under President Ebert would be continued as well as the policy of mutual understanding in the formulas which had been successfully initiated so that the terrible consequences of the war would gradually be removed.

In acknowledging Herr Loebe's greetings, President Hindenburg referred especially to "the republican constitution of August 11, 1918," adding:

"The reichstag and the reich president belong together as both are elected by direct vote of the people."

The president's voice was firm and resonant. He said he had solemnly on his word as a man, taken the oath of the constitution and he once again affirmed that he would particularly devote himself to the task of uniting the German people.

The ceremony concluded with President Loebe calling for three cheers for the German republic. The three deputies gave enthusiastically, rising from their seats.

After the conclusion of the program in the reichstag, President Hindenburg left the chamber accompanied by all the cabinet ministers. Then in the presence of a large crowd outside the reichstag building he took a salute from the reichswehr, while the crowd chanted "Deutschland Uber Alles."

After reviewing the regiment of Reichswehr President Von Hindenburg entered his motor car and accompanied by Chancellor Luther, rode to the executive mansion between two squadrons of cavalry.

FRENCH HERO OF VERDUN EXPIRES, NATION MOURNS

PARIS, May 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Charles Mangin, French hero of Verdun, died today.

General Mangin, whose far-famed defense of Verdun made him immortal in French war annals, was a comparatively young man, as he would not have been 60 until next year.

One of the most frequent comments regarding the general by those who knew him well was that he was possibly the most misunderstood man in the French army. The communists and other extremists called him the "butcher" of his own men, and his jaw gave him a forbidding mien which seemed to bear out this reputation. Those who came in contact with him, however, found him gentle and kindly.

"Mangin is a business soldier," said one of his fellow generals recently in explaining the misapprehension in which he was held in some quarters. "He knows what he wants to do and he does it with courage."

Charles Marie Emmanuel Mangin, born at Sarrebourg, on July 6, 1856, was one of the military leaders with a lifelong training as a soldier, who proved a bulwark of strength for France in repelling the German invasion during the World war.

Shortly after the outbreak of the war, he was placed in command of the Fifth infantry division and later of the Eleventh army corps.

His temporary rank of general was made permanent just before his brilliant attack in Verdun, in October, 1916, which resulted in the recapture from the Germans of Fort Douaumont. Later he became involved in the bitter controversy which followed the costly victory on the Aisne in the spring of 1917, and was deprived of his command of the sixth army.

A commission of inquiry however, exonerated him from blame and he was reinstated by Clemenceau. In July 1918, in conjunction with General Degoutte, he carried out the great counter offensive against the German right flank which brought the first of the final series of allied successes.

After the war, he was made a member of the Ruhr war council and was decorated with the grand cross of the Legion of Honor.

STAR WITNESS IN GERM CASE LEAVES OREGON

CHICAGO, May 12.—Miss Inabella Pope, fiancée of the late William N. McClintock, orphan millionaire whose father, William D. Shepherd, is charged with murder by typhoid inoculation, today was on her way to Chicago to testify in the trial of Shepherd, set for next Monday.

Miss Pope boarded a train in Oregon, according to her attorney, and is expected to be an important state witness. She went to California soon after the investigation into her fiancé's death last December 30. She had obtained a marriage license and was ready to marry young McClintock as he lay ill, and testified that Shepherd previously had told her she alone could not obtain the license and that "Billy" did not want to marry until he was better or recovered.

NO CONGRATULATIONS FOR VON HINDENBURG

PARIS, May 12.—The French, British, Italian and Belgian governments have decided to omit the usual formal congratulations to a newly elected chief of state in connection with Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, Germany's president-elect, in view of the fact that his name is still on the list of those charged with war crimes.

The four powers, it is stated, will simply forward a brief acknowledgment when notified of his assumption of the presidency.

The Noted Dead

OTTAWA, May 12.—Colonel John Chambers, died here early this morning after a lengthy illness, aged 63.

The office of "gentleman usher of the black rod," held by Colonel Chambers, is one of the oldest of British parliamentary institutions, established in 1559.

The name arises from the staff of office, a black ebony stick borne by the gentleman usher. His duties are to attend the king—in the case of Canada, the governor general—in the senate. He is responsible for the good behavior of the senate.

Indian Guides and Police Dogs Join in Search for 2 Bandits

COLFAX, Cal., May 12.—In rain and mud, posses continued today their dogged search for Joe Tanko and Floyd Hall, escaped murderers of San Quentin prison. Indian trailers, mountain residents and police dogs have hunted several days for the men who are believed to be the bandits who held up a mail stage in the mountains after killing a Sacramento merchant and severely wounding a policeman.

KLAMATH FALLS RAILROAD FIGHT RESUMED AGAIN

Council Passes An Exclusive Franchise to Strahorn That Mayor Promises to Veto—Move Started to Get Back \$300,000 City Bonus.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 12.—Another attempt to grant the Strahorn railroad franchise rights to cross Klamath Falls streets without the common-user clause, was made at the city council meeting last night, when a franchise resolution was adopted by a vote of three to two. Mayor Fred Goddard announced that he would promptly veto the resolution by next Monday night.

R. C. Groesbeck, representing the railroad declared that "hades will be frozen over 1000 years before we will grant a common-user over any of our lines."

Mayor Goddard urged the council to take steps to have the interstate commerce commission to intervene on behalf of the city of Klamath Falls in the event the Strahorn line sells out to some larger railroad. The city of Klamath Falls gave Robert E. Strahorn \$300,000 when he first started his railroad construction in this county and if plans to sell to the Southern Pacific or some other road materialize, the mayor wants the city to get back its \$300,000 which it invested as a partner with the pioneer railroad builder.

Ex-Secretary Hughes May Lead Fight On The Movie Combine

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 12.—The name of Charles E. Hughes, former secretary of state, was mentioned here today as the one who would successfully guide the destinies of the Independent Motion Picture Producers, exhibitors and exchange men in their declared fight against what they termed the "film trust," and Czar Will Hays.

TOM MIX MIXES IN MIX-UP WITH ART MIX WHICH MIXES UP THE MIX MIX-UP

LOS ANGELES, May 12.—The mix-up among the Mixes over George Washington Kesterson's application to change his name to Art Mix for motion picture purposes developed into such a mixup of Mix arguments in superior court yesterday that Judge C. W. Guerra postponed the matter to July 10 for full hearing.

First Kesterson explained that he already was known in films as "Art Mix" and received his mail that way. But Tom Mix, the motion picture actor, entered a protest that to allow Kesterson to mix with the Mixes legally, as a bonafide, court-sanctioned Mix, would only mix up the movie fans who have been accustomed to seeing Tom Mix on the screen.

RUM FLEET TURNS GUNS ON PACIFIC

New York Reports Effort Is Being Made to Pour Liquor Into United States Via California—Five Foreign Vessels Off San Diego—Whiskey Drops.

NEW YORK, May 12.—(A. P.)—With a business that has approached \$40,000,000 a year smashed by the dry navy's blockade, whiskey ships fleeing the Atlantic seaboard, are beginning to offer their cargoes in foreign ports at bargain rates. Meanwhile an effort is being made to pour liquor into the United States, via the Pacific coast. Five vessels, flying British and Belgian flags and stocked with well assorted cargoes are forty miles off San Diego, Cal. Their presence has been reported by the coast guard cutter Tamaroa and officers of the cutter are quoted as saying that boats of customers of the rum fleet are too speedy for the dry navy there as at present equipped, to overtake.

Presumably, the coast guard will extend its activities to prevent the thrust of Californians being satisfied in an illegal manner. When there were indications that the rum fleet was heading south to seek customers from Baltimore and Washington, the dry navy promptly met the situation. Latest advice may that 20 coast-guard craft are maintaining a tight blockade off the Virginia Capes, the dry navy having been doubled since the blockade off New England, New York and New Jersey began a week ago today.

Rear Admiral F. C. Billard, commandant of the coast guard, is known to be planning further activities. He regards it as certain to be a long siege and in the Washington office there is a big map with pins of various colors, representing the rum craft and those of his own forces.

Fog has failed to aid the diehards of the rum fleet that still linger off New York. No running of the blockade has been reported in two days of heavy mist. To prevent the fog helping rum row, the dry navy sent 14 additional armed craft out of New London. The increasing activities of the coast guard are being supplemented by considerable sponging up of liquor that leaked ashore. State police have seized 34 cases of Canadian beer in boat houses near Mount Clemens. Eight more saloons have been closed by federal padlocks in New York and a plant that did a large business in cutting and distributing rye whiskey has been raided.

In Grace Bay, Nova Scotia, whence have come many of the craft that have sold liquor for thirty New Yorkers in the last four years, liquor could be bought cheaply from two schooners if the Canadian authorities would permit it. Whiskey was offered on board yesterday at \$12 a case and champagne at correspondingly low rates. Presumably the vessels came from off the New York coast, driven home by lack of customers and need of food and water. They did no business, however, as two Canadian revenue cutters stood by.

In the annual report of the department of commerce, published today, Secretary Hoover, in statistics on the country's foreign trade last year gives \$40,000,000 as an estimate of the cost of bootlegged foreign liquor. Officials connected with the customs service are said to regard this as a low estimate.
