

KLAMATH FALLS MAN FINED \$50 FOR AUTO CRASH

William H. Lodge of Klamath Falls, manager of the Big Basin Lumber company there, was found guilty in Judge Taylor's court here yesterday afternoon of having driven his Dodge car in "a careless and imprudent manner" last Sunday on the Pacific highway, thereby causing an accident, and was fined \$50 and costs.

The costs were heavy, as there were so many witnesses, and in addition he had the attorney's fee to pay. Besides he lost about three days time here. Hence his over-sunday visit to Medford proved quite expensive.

His arrest grew out of the fact that on the Pacific highway near Phoenix last Sunday his car ran into the rear of a wagon, in which were Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Herford and young son of Talent, enroute to Medford, hurling them from their seats and damaging the wagon.

Mr. Lodge's main defense was that the brakes of his car refused to function properly when, as all the evidence showed, he applied them about 100 feet in the rear of the wagon, and therefore he had no option other than to ram the wagon or go off the road. He and others in the car also claimed that the pavement was wet, although this feature was refuted by many people nearby who witnessed the accident.

The Klamath Falls man's own witness, an auto mechanic, showed there was nothing in his contention about brakes failing to work. Mr. Lodge had previously testified that he was only going 28 miles an hour.

After the accident Mr. Lodge employed a local mechanic to test out the brakes of his car, and this mechanic stated on the witness stand that in the tests he made at 28 miles an hour he was able to stop the car within 30 feet.

Lodge also recompensed Mr. Herford for all damage to the latter's wagon.

District Attorney Chaney represented the prosecution at the trial, and Attorney G. M. Roberts the defense.

WALLACE McCAMANT MAY BE APPOINTED

WASHINGTON, May 12.—A new slate of prominent lawyers was understood today to be under consideration by President Coolidge for the post of solicitor general, left vacant by the resignation of James M. Beck.

Prominent on the new list of eligibles, it was said, is the name of William V. Hodges of Denver, treasurer of the republican national committee.

Another name that appeared as probably under consideration was that of Judge Wallace McCamant of Portland, Ore., former associate justice of the Oregon supreme court, who is a guest of the president at the White House.

Judge McCamant also is prominently known in the west.

chairman of the board of inland revenue and governor of the Cape of Good Hope. At the close of the Boer war recognition came to him for his administrative services in South Africa and in addition to being created a viscount he was made governor of the Transvaal and Orange River colonies as well as being appointed high commissioner. He returned to England in 1905 and, as his party was at that time out of power, he retired to his estates.

When David Lloyd George became prime minister in December, 1916, Lord Milner entered the cabinet as minister without portfolio. He became minister for war in 1918 and the next year was named secretary of state for the colonies. The manner in which he handled the Irish situation, which had become acute, did not satisfy the conservatives of the coalition government or the Irish factions, and he resigned in February, 1921.

Son of a Doctor.

Lord Milner was created a knight of the garter by royal warrant, being at that time the only member not of royal birth. He was born March 23, 1854, the son of Dr. Charles Milner, a country physician of moderate circumstances. After the son had completed his elementary education an opportunity was offered to him to travel in Germany, where he continued his studies. Upon his return to England he entered Balliol college, Oxford, to study law, received his M. A. degree and was entered at Temple bar in 1881.

For 14 years Lord Milner earned a rather scanty living at the courts, supplementing his practice with journalistic work. While on the staff of the Pall Mall Gazette, the leading political afternoon newspaper of that time, he became acquainted with the leaders of the liberal party, who urged him to make his unsuccessful attempt to enter parliament.

In 1921 Lord Milner married the widow of Lord Edward Cecil. She was Violet Georgina Maxse, a daughter of the late Admiral Frederick Augustus Maxse. Lord Milner published several volumes of a political nature, among them being "England and Egypt," "The Nation and the Empire" and "Questions of the Hour," the last appearing in 1923.

SOCIALIST CABINET IS FORMED IN BELGIUM

BRUSSELS, May 12.—(By Associated Press.) Van De Wyvere today succeeded in forming a new Belgian cabinet to succeed that of former Premier Theunis which resigned several weeks ago.

Mr. Van De Wyvere will hold the finance ministry as well as the premiership. Leo Theunis, president of the Brussels Bar association will be minister of justice and General Holbaert will take the ministry of national defense. The other portfolios will be held by their incumbents during the Theunis government.

COOS BAY RANCHER KILLED BY BOLT IN THUNDER STORM

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 12.—Fred Weaver, 40, well known rancher on the Coos river, twelve miles from Marshfield, was killed by lightning late yesterday in a hail and electrical storm. Weaver was the first person ever known to meet such a death in this part of the Pacific coast.

The body was found under a tree about three hours after the storm had subsided. Weaver had been struck on his left side which was burned. One shoe was split.

Weaver was on his way to the river dock to meet a boat bringing groceries for a number of years. He was formerly a grocery dealer in Marshfield and had resided in Coos county for a number of years. He is survived by a widow and children.

MOSCOW SUICIDE CAUSES SENSATION

MOSCOW, May 12.—By the Associated Press.—The suicide of General Boris Savinkoff, anti-bolshevik leader and former assistant minister of war under Kerensky, who threw himself from the window of his cell in the state political department prison in Moscow, has caused a sensation. Although the suicide occurred May 7, it was not announced to the public by the soviet press until today. Savinkoff was serving a long prison term for counter revolution. After turning informer for the state, he was accorded many privileges in the Moscow prison and it was believed he was as content with his lot as a man could be, under the circumstances.

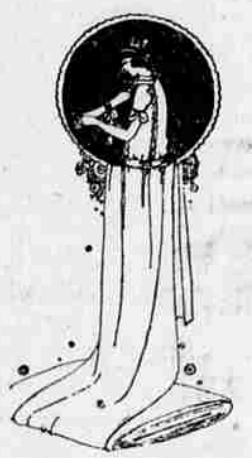
