

CHANGES MADE IN DEDICATION OF LOCAL MAUSOLEUM

Some changes have been made in the program for the dedication of the mausoleum in the I. O. O. F. cemetery next Wednesday. Instead of having a march on foot down Main street, the visiting Odd Fellows who will be in attendance at the state grand lodge session at Ashland next week will be driven in autos from Ashland to the Medford cemetery.

It has been decided to give the visitors a chance for a more extended glimpse of the orchard districts of the valley. The auto procession will leave the highway south of town and pass through the Bear Creek orchard district to South Oakdale street, thence through that street to Main and through Main to the cemetery.

After the dedication ceremonies the visitors will be routed by another drive of sight-seeing back to Ashland.

Officer McMahon will co-operate with the committees in charge to prevent interruption and congestion during the trip. Permission will be sought to have traffic on Main street as limited as possible while the visiting delegation is passing through.

Judge Henry Westbrook of Portland is scheduled to deliver the address at the dedicatory services and L. E. Carter, grand master of the state grand lodge of Odd Fellows, will give the reading, "Hall of Fame." The program, now completed, will be given as heretofore announced. The services will begin about 5 o'clock, and the public is invited to witness the same.

The Rebekah lodge of Medford is endeavoring to prepare a float to be entered in the parade in Ashland in the forenoon next Wednesday and this float will be returned to Medford in the afternoon procession.

All Odd Fellows, whether delegates to the grand lodge or not, are requested to keep in mind the breakfast at the summit of the Siskiyou Thursday morning. This event is for all members. The line will leave Ashland at 7 a. m.
