DRIVING 800 FT. TUNNEL IN NEW GOLD HILL MINE

GOLD HILL, May 15.—(Special)—The Kelmar-Vanpet Mining & Development company, recently incorporated by Gold Hill and Verona, Oregon people, commenced actual operations last Monday in driving the 800-foot mining tunnel on the Kellogg-Martinez 40-acre tract adjoining the city limits of Gold Hill on the north. This tunnel into the mountains will cut three parallel of high grade copper and gold bearing ore, beside a large deposit of talc and limestone, running through the property at a depth of 304 feet. This property has been purchased by the new concern and is considered the largest deposit of iron, copper and gold in the Gold Hill district, which is also an ideal fluxing ore and necessary in supplying the local smelter, which now seems assured with the general resumption of gold mining in the Gold Hill district. The officers of the new company are A. W. Peterson of Verona, Oregon; W. W. Martineau, vice-president; A. E. Kellogg, secretary-treasurer, and L. H. Van Horn, manager, of Gold Hill.

The building for housing the drill machinery and blacksmith shop has been completed and the equipment is being placed in position, and drilling on the tunnel will commence as soon as the portal of the tunnel is timbered and track is laid to handle the debris of the tunnel, which will be crushed on the ground to supply the city of Gold Hill and the county for road material. The portal of the tunnel is situated on the Gold Hill-Sams Valley highway that is being reconstructed into a market highway by the government, state and county.
