EDDIE SHANNON AND WIFE HELD IN BOOZE CASE

Eddie Shannon, a couple of years ago a lightweight pugilist of some renown on the coast and his wife, were arrested late Saturday, by the sheriff, charged with possession of the 40-gallon still, found on the farm, Shannon and his brother retained in the Applegate district. Both waived their preliminary hearing week

and were bound over to the grand jury, under bonds of \$1000.

At Shannon, arrested on the same charge with Denny Shannon, Jimmy Martin, pugilist, Gus Sorenson, a wrestler, and Nig Yeager, of Portland, heavyweight fighter, known to ring fame as the "Duke of Albion," was released on \$1000 bonds Saturday. Eddie Shannon boxed Johnny Carlson at Ashland last Fourth of July, to a fast draw.

It is expected that the grand jury will convene the middle of the week to consider the moonshine case, and if true bills are returned, trial of the accused will be set for the petition term, which commences next week.

OREGON RIVERS START TO RISE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 18.—The annual spring freshet has arrived, two to three weeks earlier than usual. Just how high the crest of the freshet will reach depends entirely upon temperature in the mountains at the headwaters of the Snake and Columbia rivers.

The Willamette river in Portland is steadily rising, due to backwater from the flooded stage of the Columbia. The water this morning registered 16.7 feet. Predictions are for 17.3 feet on Tuesday; 17.8 feet on Wednesday and 18.2 feet on Thursday.
