### State Must Raise \$300,000 to Pay Up Spanish War Vets

SALEM, Ore., May 16.—Because of an amendment by the 1925 legislature to the ex-service men's bonus and loan act whereby the benefits of the act will apply to Spanish war veterans, it will be necessary for the ex-service men's stand aid commission to create a fund of about \$300,000 for the purpose. This will probably be done by a bond issue. The state bond commission will on Wednesday of this week sell irrigation district bonds in the sum of \$122,000.

### ROSE FESTIVAL GETS U. S. SUBMARINE FLEET

SALEM, Ore., May 18.—Governor Pierce today received a telegram from the secretary of the navy stating that instructions have been issued to the commander of the battleships now in the Pacific to detail the submarine tender Savannah and submarine divisions No. 11 comprising submarines S-24, 25, 26, 27, 28 and 29 to Portland for the annual Rose festival June 15 to 20.

The governor had requested that a portion of the fleet be sent to Portland.

### FEAR FILIPINO SCOUTS KILLED BY NEGROES

MANILA, May 18.—American military authorities at Camp Stotsenburg believe the three Filipino scouts who have been absent for more than a week were murdered by Negroite outlaws in the mountains near Stotsenburg. The scouts were hunting game, instead of deserting as was first reported. It is believed the Negroite killed the scouts with bows and arrows for the purpose of securing their guns.

### LADY GRACE ESME DESERTS HUSBAND NO. 3 IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, May 18.—(By Associated Press.)—An advertisement published yesterday in the personal column of a local newspaper over the name of Frank Teague Jennings, manufacturer of Columbia, S. C., Augusta, Ga. and New York, and third husband of the former Lady Grace Esme McKenzie, announced that Mr. Jennings had been deserted by his wife seven weeks ago, and that he disclaimed any debts incurred by her.

The advertisement was inserted by Jennings' brother, George. It was reported at the newspaper office. Inquiry at Frank Jennings' home showed he had been out of town for two weeks and was not expected to return soon.

Lady McKenzie, who is said to derive her title from her first husband, Farquhar McKenzie, son of a Scottish peer, was married to Jennings at her apartment in the Hotel Netherlands on February 4, by the Rev. Randolph Bay, rector of the Little Church Around the Corner.

After their wedding Jennings declared his wife would relinquish her title and be "plain Mrs. Frank Teague Jennings." He added that if she wished to return to Africa, scene of her lion and elephant hunts, it would be a pleasure trip and not with a hunting expedition. Lady McKenzie's present address could not be ascertained here. Lady McKenzie's second husband, Ernest L. Frisbe, of Buffalo, married the marriage. She did not contest the suit in which he alleged misrepresentation, declaring that she was not a noblewoman.

### 43 MEN KILLED IN MINE EXPLOSION

DORSTFELD, Germany, May 18.—(By Associated Press.) The number of known dead in the mine explosion here Saturday has reached 43 with 27 injured.

The work of the trapped miners' comrades in recovering the bodies and rescuing the wounded, constitutes one of the heroic pages in the mining history of this region. The approach to the victims was both difficult and dangerous. Oxygen apparatus could not be carried on the backs of the rescuers, but had to be dragged with difficulty through narrow passages.

Many in the rescue expeditions were overcome by poisonous gases. President Von Hindenburg, Chancellor Luther and Dr. Otto Braun, Prussian premier, have telegraphed messages of condolence.

### PUGET SOUND HERMIT LEAVES BIG FORTUNE

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., May 18.—Loren Smith, a recluse who died here Saturday night, left \$100,000 in United States bonds and \$20,000 in cash besides a valuable farm, an investigation has revealed.

Smith had lived in a cabin near Port Townsend for more than thirty years. He was forcibly taken to a hospital by Clallam county authorities.

He had imagined everyone was after his money and when persons approached his cabin he ordered them away with a gun. He was about 70 years old and has relatives in England.

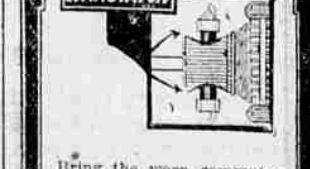
