GOOD PROGRAM AT VAUDEVILLE TONIGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., May 19.—Federal Judge C. E. Bean this morning overruled the motion of Horace Greely Wilson of Roseburg, former Klamath Indian agent, for a third postponement of his trial on charges of violating the Mann act. Wilson asked a further delay of six months.

"This appeal coming on the eve of trial comes too late," declared Judge Bean. "The fact that the defendant is without money is no ground for postponing a criminal trial. If this ground would be upheld, it would not be long until this excuse would be used to postpone every criminal trial that is set."

Judge Bean stated that the case had already been postponed several times upon the request of the defendant, and that "there is no assurance that he will be any more ready for trial at the end of six months than he is today."

Wilson offered an affidavit that averred he had tried to sell his land in order to get money for his defense that he had been unable to do so, that his first attorney had quit and that his present counsel, L. R. Sandblast of Portland, had only had the case a few days, that he could not bring witnesses here to combat the first three counts in the indictment and that it would be necessary for him to have six months in order to prepare the defense.

In replying Assistant United States Attorney Joseph Stearns declared:

"The government has shown the defendant every consideration. But I have it on most excellent authority that Mr. Wilson openly boasted on the streets of his home in Roseburg that this case would never come to trial. I have been informed that during the time he was supposed to be traveling about getting his witnesses and trying to sell his property he was playing cards in the club in Roseburg."

Stearns said the government has spent more than \$5000 bringing witnesses here from Washington, New York, Chicago, Minneapolis, Los Angeles and other places.

AMERICA WINS ON SHIP SEARCH

GENEVA, May 19.—(A. P.)—The amendment to establish the right to search ships suspected of conveying arms improperly was today eliminated from the proposed convention of the international conference for the control of traffic in arms and munitions. The American delegation led the opposition to the amendment. The Geneva conference also voted today to abandon the proposed plan of a central board under the League of Nations to regulate traffic in arms and munitions. The American delegation had opposed such a board.

Ibanez's Son Jailed. PARIS, May 19.—(A. P.)—Blasco Ibanez, the Spanish novelist and opponent of the present Spanish government, today reported that his son, Siegfried, has been jailed in Valencia, Spain, for distributing his father's latest propaganda pamphlets.
