WALTER JOHNSON WINS GAME BY HITTING A HOMER

NEW YORK, May 20.—(A. P.)—The baseball writers committee of the American league today had another credit mark to place opposite the name of Walter Johnson in the 1925 race for recognition as the sport's most valuable player. When he can't win a ball game for the Senators with one arm from the pitching slab, he jumps in with two hands and settles the issue with a potent bat.

With the champions trailing Cleveland, 3 to 2, and a Washington player on base, Johnson came to the rescue of the capital team yesterday with a record home run over the right field fence—the first blow of the kind by a right-hand biter in the history of the Cleveland park. Victory carried Washington within a single game of first place.

KLAMATH FALLS HAS THRILLING FIGHT CARD

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 20.—Roscoe Strambo of Portland and Sammy Olson of Galesburg, Ill., fought ten slashing rounds to a draw in the main event of the municipal boxing commission card here last night. Hopelessly beaten in the earlier rounds, Strambo came back in the last four cantos and fought his heavier opponent off his feet. In the semi-windup, Joe Coffman of Portland, knocked out Jack Crim, Modoc Indian in the fourth round. The boys were welterweights.

Wilbur Harrington, Klamath Indian, got the call over Young Felix of Weed, Cal., in another torrid bout. Al Sharp knocked out Tommy Carter in the first round of the preliminary.

Mickey Rockson Wins.
PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—Mickey Rockson, light-heavyweight of Boise, Idaho, won a ten round decision in the main event here last night from Dynamite George of Los Angeles. Rockson in the last five rounds, piled up a lead sufficient to give him the call.

RAIN RECORDS FOR MAY IN OREGON BADLY SHATTERED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 20.—Enough rain fell in Klamath county last night to supply the country for an entire month, according to the local office of the reclamation service. Rainfall totaled .77 of an inch, or more than has fallen during the entire month of May for the past ten years. Farmers throughout the county are jubilant. The only damage reported was to unimproved roads.

BEND, Ore., May 20.—A steady rain which began falling here early last night continued this morning and at eight o'clock a total of .96 of an inch had fallen for the 24 hour period ending then. This brings the total precipitation for the month to more than two inches. Range conditions all over central Oregon are reported to be in unusually good condition as a result of the rains. Heavy rains have been falling in the mountains and near flood conditions are reported from Crane prairie. Grain on the meadows is unusually good condition there. Forestry officials who have just returned from an inspection trip, report.

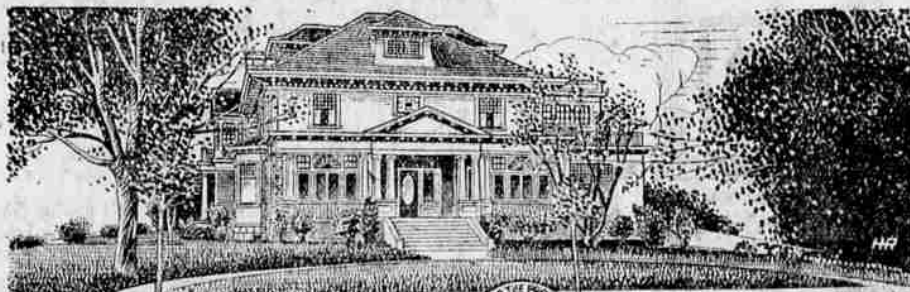
RANGE SALE EXPERT GIVES ADDRESS TO COPCO EMPLOYEES
