

PIERCE PROTESTS TO GOVERNMENT ON PRIEST DAM

SALEM, Ore., May 20.—Hundreds of protests received by Governor Pierce against the proposed construction of the Priest Rapids dam in the Columbia River have caused the governor to send a letter to the secretary of the interior declaring that unless assurance is given that the fishing industry will not be injured by the project the state of Oregon will try to prevent the improvement or demand that facilities to protect salmon propagation be installed by the builders.

The federal power commission has issued a license for construction of the dam to the Washington Irrigation and Development company, which is organized under the laws of the state of Washington. In his letter to the secretary of the interior, Governor Pierce says the dam will interfere with the passage of salmon up the river to their spawning grounds. Some of the best minds on the Pacific coast, the governor tells the cabinet member, aver that construction of the dam will destroy the salmon industry. It is said that heretofore no satisfactory device has been found whereby salmon are enabled to get above a dam the size of that proposed at Priest Rapids.

"Inferno" Film Scores Hit.
