

CALL ATTENTION OF WATER USERS TO LATEST LAWS

The attention of city water users is called to the following section of ordinance now in effect.

Sec. 1.—Each 5000 square feet or less with house, having one kitchen and occupied by one family with or without bath, toilet and sink, \$1.75. Each additional family or kitchen, \$1.00.

Sec. 6.—All extra area of either lawn or garden in excess of 5000 square feet adjoining or used in conjunction with any residence shall be charged at the rate of ten (10) cents per hundred square feet or fraction thereof which charge shall be payable June 1st, each year. If said amount is not paid it shall become delinquent and in case it is not paid the water for the balance of the year shall be shut off not only upon the area in excess of 5000 square feet, but also upon the residence to which it is adjacent or appurtenant.

Sec. 10.—On the failure of any owner or consumer to comply with the rules and regulations hereby established as a condition to the use of city water, or to pay the rates hereby established on or before fifteen (15) days after the same becomes due, the water supply to any such owner or consumer shall be shut off by said city without notice, until such time as payment is made of the amount due, together with the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) additional as penalty for the expense of turning the same off.

Sec. 17.—Water will not be furnished, except through meter to any premises where there are defective or leaking pipes, faucets, closets, or other fixtures or where there are water closets, or urinals without self-closing valves, and when such leakage or other defects are discovered, the water shall be turned off by the city until repairs are made. All tanks are required to have self-action float valves.

Sec. 18.—Consumers shall keep all pipes and faucets on their respective premises in repair at their own expense and will be held liable for any leakage and all damage which may result from their failure to do so.

The Screen

Fox "Inferno" Is Beautiful.

The William Fox motion picture, made from Dante's celebrated classic, "Inferno," closes a very successful three days' engagement at the Elitio theatre tonight. This production seems to have a lion's share of attributes which popularize a film. It is eye-filling and imaginative and contains some extremely high spots of exciting drama. Perhaps the picture's greatest appeal is its weird, photographic beauty.

Henry Otto, who directed, has seen fit to stick more closely to his text than some other directors working on literary classics have been known to do. His job (or was it the scenario man's?) to select such episodes from the great "Inferno" allegory as make the best motion pictures has been well done. The direction is entirely worthy of so important a subject.

Religious "Fundamentalists" need have no fears that their hell has been misrepresented. For six centuries Dante's Hell has been a model upon which conceptions of the infernal regions have been built. The film has simply translated Dante's vision into terms of the screen. A modern story, dramatically told, balances the inferno sequences with fine effect. Pauline Starke, Ralph Lewis, Josef Swickard and William Scott head the cast.

Western Film at Craterian.

For scenery that is delightful to the eye, "The Great Divide," at the Hunt's Craterian theater this week (closing off tomorrow for the legitimate attraction "So This is London") is to be commended. The action, or much of it, takes place along the rim of the Painted Desert in Arizona, and competent photography has depicted a land of rare charm. One lacks words adequately to describe the Painted Desert as shown in this film.

The story, a western romance that is thoroughly clean entertainment, has to do with Ruth Jordan of a New England family, who, left by her brother and his wife alone on a ranch on the rim of the desert, is attacked at night by three drunken ranchers. One, Stephen Ghent, pays with a string of nuggets for her freedom, when she promises to accompany him to his mine as his wife.

A run over the cast reveals one potent reason why the picture is well done. Such names as Alice Terry, Conway Tearle, Huntley Gordon, Zasu Pitts, Wallace Beery grace any

The ladies are not invited to attend this ceremonial, the wording of the invitations being that "The temple has got to economize in order to send the patrol to Los Angeles."



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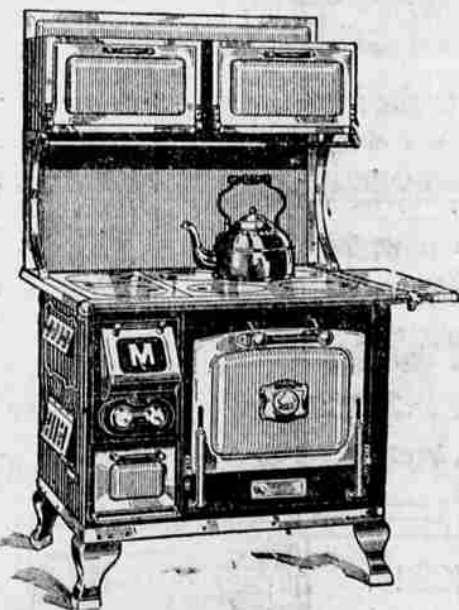
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
