

CARS SEIZED IN DRY RAIDS TO BE USED BY AGENTS

WASHINGTON, May 21.—(By Associated Press.) Thirty motor cars, seized from bootleggers were turned against the Canadian border rum runners today by the treasury department which for the first time made use of recent legislation under which the government is empowered to use the confiscated vehicles.

Orders were sent to John C. Tulloch, customs collector at Ogdensburg, N. Y., to hand over the machines to members of the customs service border patrol and they will go into service at the beginning of the annual move of Americans to Canada for summer vacations.

The treasury's action is regarded as the first step toward motorization of border patrols, both Canadian and Mexican, to be completed as fast as machines are available.

Collector Tulloch has 160 cars, all seized in the last year.

BIG CONTINENT YET UNDISCOVERED, SAYS DONALD B. M'MILLAN

NEW YORK, May 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—Donald B. MacMillan, noted explorer, in town for the christening of the "Peary," one of the two ships equipped with three airplanes which will leave for the north June 17, under his command, told of the miracle of an unknown continent which is luring him to the Arctic again.

"We believe that there is a vast unexplored continent, possibly one million miles in area, to the west of northern Greenland," he said.

"Admiral Peary named it Crockerland, but we have only indirect evidence of its existence. Both Admiral Peary and myself have seen the mirage or reflection of it in the sky, repeatedly and the action of the ice and the condition of the ice surrounding the area are additional scientific indications of its existence."

Radio News

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—The San Francisco Examiner today said that tests conducted with Helen Keller, deaf and blind woman, at the powerful KGO transmitting station here, give to radio engineers considerable encouragement in their belief that sounds can be perceived by deaf persons by impressions received through the finger tips from a vibrating diaphragm as used in the radio head piece.

The tests, the story says, were begun in a stumbling manner, but the results were sufficient to cause the engineers to plan further experiments, with Miss Keller as the subject.

In the experiments conducted yesterday, Miss Keller placed her fingers upon an ear piece diaphragm and found that she could distinguish the vibrations caused by instrumental music from those produced by the voice, the article states. One of the engineers then spoke through the microphone and several times words were repeated by the woman.

Baptist Case Hangs Fire

FRANCE EXPECTED TO INSIST BERLIN PAY WAR DEBTS

WASHINGTON, May 21.—(A. P.)—Official Washington read with interest today overnight news dispatches presenting new developments in the inter-allied debt situation, lately revived by announcement that this government is desirous of receiving from its nine European debtors proposals for settlement.

Particular attention was given to advices from London crediting William R. Green, chairman of the ways and means committee with the opinion that France might insist upon relating her debt payments to receipt of reparations from Germany.

In a copyrighted story in the Baltimore Sun, Mr. Green declared he saw little prospect of early settlement of the French debt unless Washington agrees to the reparations proposal.

Italy's debt was brought into the foreground yesterday by Premier Mussolini who told the senate that Italy's sacrifices in the World War should entitle her to preferred status in regard to payment although he declared his country will face its debts, compatible with economic and financial conditions.

Premier Mussolini's statement that Italy's creditors should be lenient and that her debt payments should be conditioned on her ability to pay reflects the wish of this government not to harass its debtors and avoid harsh terms.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—(By Associated Press.) With France, Belgium and Estonia leading the way, officials here are optimistic that the six other European debtors soon will find the way clear to begin negotiations looking to funding their war obligations to this country.

President Coolidge shares with Secretaries Kellogg and Mellon the hope that the entire debt situation will be clarified within a reasonable time, but there is no desire or intention to unduly press the question. Neither do officials expect the foreign governments whose notes are held here to rush to Washington with complete, detailed plans for settlement.

It is hoped, however, that those powers will find the occasion suitable for at least discussion with the American debt commission of terms of settlement upon which agreement could be reached.

News from Paris that Premier Painleve, Foreign Minister Briand and Finance Minister Caillaux had discussed together the debt situation evoked much interest here. An official spokesman of the Quai d'Orsay announced that the debt situation could be said to have entered the state of "real official negotiations," and that the three leaders would confer later this week with experts of the foreign office.

The conference will consider suggestions for a settlement proposal which will be sent simultaneously to Washington and London, the impression in Paris being that it would be ready this week for transmission.

VICTIM OF KIDNAP FIEND IS DYING

WINTHROP, Maine, May 21.—(A. P.)—The second man hunt within a month through the woods of northern New England was in progress today for the man who shot down Mrs. Emma M. Towns at her cottage on Lake Maranacook, yesterday, and is then believed to have kidnapped her 35-year-old niece, Aida Hayward, after setting fire to the cottage.

Mrs. Towns was unconscious today and physicians said she was dying. She told of a man who fired at her twice without warning.

MISS WETHERED IS VICTORIOUS AGAIN

TROON, Scotland, May 21.—Miss Joyce Wethered, the defending champion, who yesterday eliminated Miss Glenna Collett, the last American contender in the women's golf championship, continued her triumphant march toward the finals by defeating Mrs. F. J. Jamieson of Malahide island.

Boss of Ku Klux Plans to Use "Big Stick" in Washington



The Ku Klux Klan is attempting to set up in Washington a "lobby" as powerful as that of the Anti-Saloon League, in the expectancy of influencing legislation in the direction of its "ideals," observers in the National capital believe. Hiram W. Evans, imperial wizard of the Klan, has moved his headquarters and his "imperial palace" to Washington, and Atlanta will be the capital of the "Invisible Empire" in name only henceforth, it is declared. How Tree Hunt Yielded Leprosy Cure

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Release of four lepers as "cured" from the National Leprosarium in Carville, Louisiana, after treatment which included the use of chaulmoogra oil, is the climax of an adventurous chapter in plant exploration.

Joseph F. Rock, leader of the National Geographic Society expedition to Yunnan, province, China, is the plant hunter who braved tigers, crocodiles and wild elephants to get seeds from the chaulmoogra tree so plentiful in the mountains of Yunnan, which would yield the healing oil.

Recounting his experiences during his tree hunt in southeast Asia, Dr. Rock writes to the National Geographic society:

"Chaulmoogra oil is obtained from the seeds of a tree known as Taraktogenos Kurzii, named by Sir George King in honor of its discoverer, Kurz.

Treatment Known to Natives
"The natives of southeastern Asia have long known of the curative properties of Chaulmoogra seeds in skin diseases and especially in leprosy. They relate in their pre-Buddhist legends a story of one of the Burmese kings who retired into the jungle, making a hollow tree his abode. Here he partook of the fruits and leaves of the Kalaw tree (Taraktogenos Kurzii) and in time his health was restored.

"Owing to the high value of the oil in the United States and the probable security of it in the near future, due to its successful application in the treatment of leprosy in Hawaii, I was authorized to obtain seeds of this species, to be introduced into Hawaii and our tropical possessions, with a view to establishing Chaulmoogra plantations."

(In his search for the Chaulmoogra tree Dr. Rock went first to Siam, entering that country by way of Singapore. He proceeded by rail to Bangkok, thence to Chiangmai and back to Korat, then to Chiangmai again, down the Meh Ping river to Rahang, across country by way of Mesaot, Kawkaek, and Kyopdu to Moumein, to Amarapura, Sagaleng, and Monywa by rail, up the Chindwin river to Mawlaik, then eastward thru forest and over mountain to Kyokta, where the seeds were finally obtained.)

Swims in Crocodile Waters
"At Chiangmai I chartered a houseboat for a journey down the tortuous Meh Ping river to Rahang, and thence overland to Moumein, Burma. I left Chiangmai December 2, 1920, on a commodious houseboat manned by a Lao crew, an interpreter, a would-be cook and boy. Many times during the day I would stop the boat and climb the mountains to explore the forests and collect plants.

"The river at this season being low, it was difficult to make a landing. We tarried only long enough to dispose of many bags of rice, the cause of our constantly grounding on sand banks. Once I lost patience and, being in negligence, I quietly jumped overboard and swam ahead of the boat, expecting it to follow soon. Anxious calls from the captain urged me to return to the boat, quite a difficult matter against the current. The waters, I learned afterward, are said to be infested with crocodiles.

"When I called on the governor of Mesaot he was holding court for the trial of elephant thieves, who carry on a prosperous business near the border. Leaving his chained prisoners sitting on the floor, the magistrate accompanied me to the rest-house where Siamese officials stop when en route from Rahang.

"By the Old Moumein Pagoda"
"Our path lay across the Kawkaek hills, which are covered with glorious verdure, and it was in this region that I first encountered Taraktogenos Kurzii. Unfortunately, it was in fruit. I was in formed by a Burmese village quack that July is the month in which the Chaulmoogra

"I sent my magic piece of paper ahead by special messenger, and when I arrived at Kyokta, the village in question, I found a bamboo mat spread in the village square near the Pongyi Khung, a little pagoda, with an old and only chair in the center and the peasants sitting around the mat.

"I made myself as comfortable as possible in my little camp on the edge of the jungle, for this village is surrounded on three sides by dense forest. The next day I started out with 36 coolies, determined to come back to camp loaded with Chaulmoogra seeds. We had five or six miles to walk, always following a dry creek bed through the dense forest. These creek beds are as flat as a floor, with no rocks visible. For miles there was only fine quartz sand, which made marching easy.

"We passed through vegetation similar to that at Khong Kyew until we struck the Chaulmoogra forests. There we separated into smaller parties and seed-collecting began in earnest.

Bears and Tiger Tracks
"While thus engaged we met a mother bear with her cub. With wild shouts from the natives she was driven off, leaving behind her young, which my Burmese coolies insisted on taking to the village.

"Loaded with seeds, we started down the steep hillside, which are covered with Chaulmoogra trees, glad at heart that at last I had been successful.

"When we reached the stream bed up which we had come a few hours previously, we found that a large tiger had followed us into the jungle, for there were its footprints as clear and distinct that I stopped and photographed them. We had no arms with us; only a camera and quantities of Chaulmoogra seeds."

Germany Appeals to Court.
GENEVA, May 21.—(A. P.)—It was officially announced today that Germany has appealed to the world

court of justice to settle her dispute with Poland cancelling the exportation by Poland in Polish Upper Silesia of Germany-owned industrial property.

Secretary Weeks to See Doctors.
WASHINGTON, May 20.—(A. P.)—Secretary Weeks of the war department who is recovering from an attack of thrombosis about six weeks ago, plans to go to New England within a few days for a consultation of physicians to determine whether a gall bladder drainage operation is necessary.

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
