EDEN PRECINCT, May 21.—The farmers of Fern Valley have been planting out tomatoes in great quantities the past week or ten days. Geo. Afford and Iain Hughes and Charlie Ferns have each set out several acres. These farmers are anxious to raise melons and tomatoes and other garden truck on their fertile land.

Closing exercises at the Phoenix school were greatly enjoyed by a large attendance. The work for the year has been very creditable, the corps of teachers have encouraged the pupils to bend every effort to make the year's work count. There has been less play and more earnest work this year than heretofore.

Many of the telephone subscribers in the rural districts vowed they would discard their phones when the rates were raised, but like everything else they find it little use to kick about the high cost, so they just raised the price of spuds and hay and eggs to make up the difference. George Hartley of Nuth Talent has about an acre of head lettuce which is looking fine and will soon be ready for market. George is one of the many good gardeners in this part of the valley and he always has a fine garden, and furnishes Medford markets with his produce.

We are sorry to have to say that Mrs. Ella Patterson had to undergo a second operation last week, and it left her very weak. Mrs. Patterson has been a great sufferer and it was hoped she could escape another operation.

Ed Phipps of Medford took out the last of the tomato plants from the Carey Plant Farm last Wednesday. Mr. Phipps is setting out about twelve acres of tomatoes.

Mrs. C. Carey last week sold 160 White Leghorn hens and is in the market for another bunch of good stock if the price is right. Mrs. Carey will keep about 400 hens this winter if young stock can be procured.

Several of Talent's enlisted young men have been called out to take part in the work of fixing up the grounds for the encampment in this valley in June. Many of them have had to let their plans for the spring work go and answered the call to work for the government.

Mr. and Mrs. Colver Furry of East Eden are having an addition built onto their house. Mr. Furry has a fine tract of land and all under the ditch. The place is in alfalfa and he cuts three and four crops a year.

The Attention of City Water Users Is Called to the Following Section of Ordinance Now in Effect

Sec. 1. Each 5000 square feet or less with house having one kitchen and occupied by one family, with or without bath, toilet and sink.....\$1.75
Each additional family or kitchen..... 1.00

Sec. 6. All extra area of either lawn or garden in excess of 5000 square feet adjoining or used in conjunction with any residence shall be charged at the rate of ten (10) cents per hundred square feet or fraction thereof, which charge shall be payable June 1st of each year.

If said amount is not paid it shall become delinquent as other water charges become delinquent, and in case it is not paid the water for the balance of the year shall be shut off, not only upon the area in excess of 5000 square feet, but also upon the residence to which it is adjacent or appurtenant.

Sec. 10. On the failure of any owner or consumer to comply with the rules and regulations hereby established as a condition to the use of city water, or to pay the rates hereby established on or before fifteen (15) days after the same becomes due, the water supply to any owner or consumer SHALL be shut off by said city without notice until such time as payment is made of the amount due, together with the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) additional as penalty for the expense of turning the same off.

Sec. 17. Water will not be furnished, except through meter, to any premises where there are defective or leaking pipes, faucets, closets, or other fixtures, or where there are water closets, or urinals without self-closing valves, and when such leakage or other defects are discovered the water shall be turned off by the city until repairs are made.

All tanks are required to have self-action float valves.

Sec. 18. Consumers shall keep all pipes and faucets on their respective premises in repair at their own expense and will be held liable for any leakage and all damage which may result from their failure to do so.


