JUDGE CAREY TO BE COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER, MAY 29

Superintendent of Schools Smith and members of the school board, who have been encountering difficulty in obtaining a well-known man of ability to deliver the address at the high school commencement at the Craterian a week from tonight, finally made a ten-strike, as Judge Charles H. Carey of the law firm of Carey & Kerr of Portland, one of the most prominent attorneys in the state and of the Pacific coast, in response to a telegraphic request, wired back here yesterday his hearty acceptance.

Judge Carey recently wrote a history of Oregon, is attorney for the Spokane, Portland & Seattle and the Great Northern railroads, is widely recognized as an able speaker, is chairman of the Oregon commission for the reform of court procedure. He was a delegate at large from Oregon to the last two national republican conventions.

With Judge Wolverton he represented Oregon at the American Bar association meeting in London, England, last summer.

MYSTERY SURROUNDS

ASTORIA ACCIDENT, VICTIM SAYS NOTHING

ASTORIA, May 22.—Mystery hangs about the bed of a critically injured youth in St. Mary's hospital.

Found last evening lying beside the Columbia highway near the John Day river, five miles east of Astoria, the young man has been unable or unwilling to tell the officers more than that his name is Pierce. He is suffering from a crushed chest.

A clipping in his pocket tells of the assault by hijackers upon Jack Pierce near Oregon City last Monday night, and Sheriff Slusher was trying to ascertain whether the injured man is the same Pierce who was released from the Portland jail early this week and ordered to leave the Rose City.

The John Day river, near where Pierce was found by D. Hume, is a favorite spot for the transfer of smuggled liquor from rum running motor boats to automobile trucks.

MEDFORD HAS AN OLD-FASHIONED RUNAWAY, BUT NO ONE IS HURT

A novel event for recent years in Medford where hundreds of autos have made horses almost obsolete was an old time runaway early this afternoon, which furnished much excitement and considerable damage, but no injury.

When E. Bachard of the local American Express company stepped onto a delivery wagon of the company this action so frightened the horse, which was enjoying his mid-day nap at the time, that the usually placid animal started away to a distance of fifty yards. During this flight the wagon struck the car of C. E. Fox of Central Point, which was parked on Front street, breaking a fender, and upsetting a nearby crate of chickens.

KLAMATH STAGE DRIVER IS FINED

The first case of its kind in this vicinity came up in Judge Taylor's court yesterday when Alfred Smith, a driver of the Medford-Klamath Falls stage line, was placed on trial for violating rule No. 73 of the state public service commission, which prohibits the driver of a stage from having a passenger on the front seat with him when there is a seat for such passenger in the stage body proper.

Smith pleaded guilty to the charge which had been preferred by E. C. Halley, an inspector of the public service commission, and was fined \$15. The violation of this rule by Smith occurred recently when on one of his regular interurban trips, he permitted a young woman to ride on the front seat with him, she being the only passenger on the trip.

PORTLAND FIREBUG DECLARED INSANE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22.—Chester C. Buchtel, former city fireman, who confessed starting 81 fires while he was a member of the fire department, is suffering from dementia-praecox, said a report submitted today to Presiding Circuit Judge Morrow by a commission of alienists, who have examined him since his arrest about two months ago. The commission recommended that he be placed in the asylum for life.

CHAPMAN—Emma Amelia Chapman died at her home one mile north of Beagle, Ore., May 22, from pneumonia, aged 61 years 5 months 27 days. Mrs. Chapman was born in London, England, November 25, 1853, and was married to Walter C. Funeral services will be held at the Perl Funeral Home, Monday morning at 10:30, Rev. Hamilton officiating. Interment in Medford cemetery.
