PREPARE FOR A RELIEF PARTY TO NORTH POLE

If Amundsen Is Not Heard From Soon, Search Will Be Made—U. S. Navy Is Asked for Co-operation—MacMillan Agrees to Aid.

LOS ANGELES, May 23.—(By Associated Press.) Haakon H. Hammer, associate in Roald Amundsen's previous polar flight attempts and leader of the expedition to Amundsen's relief in 1923, at present in Los Angeles, telegraphed the navy department today asking its co-operation and the services of an expert Arctic flier if it becomes necessary again to go to the assistance of the Norwegian explorer.

BOSTON, May 23.—All the plans of the Captain Donald B. MacMillan Arctic expedition will be subordinated to the relief of Roald Amundsen if Amundsen is not heard from before the MacMillan ships Bowdoin and Peary leave the country late in June.

PRESIDENT TAKEN ILL RECOVERS

All Engagements Cancelled and Doctors Called When Chief Executive Is Stricken With Indigestion—No Cause for Alarm, Declare Physicians—Plan Mayflower Trip.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(A. P.)—President Coolidge suffered an attack of indigestion today, but his physicians announced that the indisposition was yielding promptly to treatment.

Nothing "of a serious character" had developed they said, and although all engagements for the day were cancelled, the president went forward with his plans to leave the White House for his customary Saturday afternoon cruise on the Mayflower.

There had been no previous outward evidence of illness, though it was indicated that Mr. Coolidge had been feeling the effects of the increasingly hot weather of the capital.
