PEOPLE ADVISED TO SECURE DOG LICENSES NOW

The city administration will start to enforce the dog license ordinance just as soon as an officer is appointed to give his entire time to enforcement of the measure, which has not been active for years, but which the city council last Tuesday decided to bring to life and rigidity enforce.

Hence it behooves owners of pet dogs to get as soon as possible visit the city recorder's office in the city hall building, pay the license fees and obtain from the recorder metal tags which each licensed dog must wear.

After the enforcement is started all dogs found not wearing such tags will be rounded up and impounded. The license fee is \$1.50 for a male dog and \$2 for a female dog.

The only license tag taken out so far has been by Mrs. Scott Wolf, and consequently her pet fox terrier is wearing license tag No. 1.

At its next meeting the city council will pass a new ordinance forbidding any dog to be at large during the summer season, whether or not licensed. This means that each dog must be tied up or confined on the home premises of the owner.

Airplane Fire Patrol To Be Started July 1

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—Headquarters of the United States forest service here announced today that an airplane fire patrol is to be established for California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana on July 1, and will continue throughout the summer and fall fire season.

Five bases will be established, one each in northern and southern California, one in Oregon, one in Washington and one in either western Washington, northern Idaho or western Montana. Eighteen airplanes will be used. Santa Monica will be the base in southern California. None of the other bases have been selected as yet.

The pilots will be recruited from the officers of the army reserve corps but the mechanics will be from the enlisted forces for the most part.

BRAMWELL FAILS TO APPEAR, COURT MAY ASK ARREST

SALEM, Ore., May 25.—Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon today issued an order directing Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks to appear in court Wednesday morning at ten o'clock and show cause why he should not be punished for contempt of court. The action came when Bramwell failed to obey an order from the court Saturday directing him to be in court this morning to explain an affidavit of prejudice which Bramwell had filed directed at Judge McMahon. The action is taken in the case of George Putnam of Salem against Bramwell in which the plaintiff started action against Bramwell to require him to maintain the headquarters of the state banking department in Salem. Following filing of the proceedings against Bramwell, the superintendent filed the affidavit of prejudice against Judge McMahon in the affidavit charging McMahon with being prejudiced against Bramwell. On filing of the affidavit Judge McMahon declared he did not know Bramwell and insisted Bramwell explain why he considered McMahon prejudiced. Bramwell was not in court, but his attorney contended the court had no right to question Bramwell as to the facts surrounding the prejudices alleged, but the court's only course to pursue was to issue an order transferring the cause to another court.

Instead the court issued an order demanding the presence of Bramwell today to explain the affidavit of prejudice.

When the time came for Bramwell's appearance today, neither Bramwell nor his attorney appeared. Judge McMahon intimated today that in event Bramwell fails to respond to the contempt order on Wednesday

morning that he may issue a bench warrant for Bramwell's arrest.

ELK LAKE ROAD OPENED WITHIN HALF MILE

PEND, Ore., May 25.—The road into Elk Lake is now open to within a half mile of the lake, according to Bend firemen who returned late last night from the lake. Nine members of the Bend department went up Saturday night and shoveled and dynamited the snow along the road for a distance of two and a half miles. Good fishing is reported by all visiting the lake, but so far more than a three mile walk has been necessary to get into the lake.
