GRAIN RATES TO PORTLAND FROM IDAHO INCREASED

WASHINGTON, May 25.—(By Associated Press.) Increases in rates on grain and grain products moving from northern Idaho to northern Pacific coast ports, suspended since last November, today received the approval of the inter-state commerce commission. The commission has inquired into

the effect of the increases and has found them reasonable insofar as they apply to the traffic to points north of and including Portland, Ore. Present rates from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, to Portland are 25.5 cents per 100 pounds on wheat and will become 28 cents per 100 pounds under the increase. The change is illustrative of the result which the schedules have generally on the Idaho points. At the same time the commission refused to allow the railroads serving northern Idaho to advance existing rates on grain and grain products moving to California points which was also postponed by the original schedule. LOS ANGELES, May 25.—In a copyrighted story to be published by the Los Angeles Examiner tomorrow, George W. Hazeltine, aged eccentric, who died in a little shack just north of the business district here last March after years spent collecting tin cans, match boxes and other rubbish, is revealed as the late possessor of a half million dollar estate. If the old man's will stands, his two attorneys, Dell A. Schweitzer and Frank S. Hut-

ton, will receive the bulk of the fortune, however, the story continues, a grand niece, the aged man has appeared on the scene and her attorneys, who declare she is Hazeltine's sole surviving relative, announce they will seek to have the will set aside. She is Mrs. Loraine Moody Mason Richmond, granddaughter of Mrs. Mary A. Drake, Hazeltine's sister. Ten years ago, county records show, Hazeltine was defendant in an action brought by the county to compel him to pay \$195 for the care of Mrs. Drake at the county hospital for seven months.
