PROBE RESULTS OF RIGID ECONOMY ON FUTURE ARMY

WASHINGTON, May 28.—(By Associated Press.) The army general staff has been directed to make a study of the effect upon the military establishment of further progressive reduction in military appropriations should that result in the government's economy program.

The inquiry is understood to have been ordered on the basis of a White House inquiry of the war department. Whether other departments have received similar inquiries has not been disclosed.

At the navy department Secretary Whitbur would not say whether naval budget officers were engaged in a study similar to that of the war department.

Despite refusal of the war department officials to discuss the question of the annual secrecy which surrounds the study being made there, it is indicated that the progressive reduction of appropriations under consideration would become effective for the fiscal year 1927 to run for several years thereafter before reaching the cumulative total reduction contemplated in the White House suggestion.

The general budget business meeting of the government will be held June 22.

No definite information as to the contemplated aggregate cut in war department appropriations is available. There are indications, however, that it would run to a figure of between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000 to be lopped off the military appropriations included in the total of \$339,797,971 appropriated for all war department activities for the 1926 fiscal year.

The military portion of the budget for the year is \$255,388,074, which represented a reduction of approximately \$4,000,000 from the similar appropriations for the preceding year.

Despite rigid secrecy requirements imposed on army officials, it is said to be a matter of grave concern because of the effect a reduction of \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000 would have on the whole scheme of national defense.

Some officials go so far as to contend that such a cut in appropriations would compel the virtual abandonment of the organized reserve element of the new army and sharp curtailment of federal assistance to the National Guard.

HUNTINGTON PARK, Cal., May 28.—Because one of her patients "crabbed," Dr. Madeline M. Ybarra is in jail today awaiting trial on a charge of practicing medicine without a license. FRENCH RETREAT TO ANNOY RIFFIANS

PARIS, May 28.—(A. P.)—The French command in Morocco reports that the percentage of Riffian regulars in the enemy's front line has greatly increased in the last few days. The tribesmen won over to Abd-el-Krim's cause are said to be showing more and more reluctance to fight his battles and the Adrij sultan has been obliged to call upon his best and most reliable troops.

The evacuation of the French posts north of the Ouergha river continues by the Abd-el-Krim's regulars are making the movement most difficult.

FRENCH POLICY IN MOROCCO UPHELD

PARIS, May 28.—Deputy Maginot of the republican-democratic bloc today announced that the opposition in the chamber of deputies would vote confidence in the Painleve government's Moroccan policy.

This was taken to give a government majority.

M. Maginot said the opposition would support the resolution of confidence proposed by the republican bloc because it was to their interest to support the government's policy of invasion of Morocco by Abd-el-Krim.

GUILTY VERDICT IN PIERCE CASE

After deliberating for 24 hours, the jury in the trial of J. O. Pierce of Gold Hill, former driver of a school bus, and whose contract, for next year, for the same job, witnesses testified, is pending, yesterday afternoon at four o'clock, returned a verdict of guilty. The vote during the long session varied from seven to five, to eight to four for conviction, until the agreement. The defense was represented by George Roberts, and the state by District Attorney Newt Chaney.
