## NURMI ENDS TOUR, ESCAPES MAIDS AND CHANCES FOR GOLD

NEW YORK, May 29.—(A. P.)—Having accepted \$1190 for living expenses during a six months' tour of the United States and rejected offers totalling some \$20,000 to commercialize his prowess, Paavo Nurmi world's greatest runner, is on his way back to Finland. He will earn \$15 a week as a draughtsman at Helsinki and run for love of the game rather than money.

Surrounded by athletes, officials and admirers, Paavo yesterday made his adieu, and found himself harried by young women who sought to get within kissing range as he was about to board the liner, Stockholm.

Frederick W. Rubien, secretary of the A. A. U., tested an account of Nurmi's expenditures. The \$1190 represented 170 days' living expenses at \$7 a day. In addition \$175.50 was spent for telegrams and telephone calls in Nurmi's behalf, his fare home cost \$200 and transportation from New York to various parts of the country in which he engaged in meets, was paid. His passage to this country was provided by a club.

Mr. Rubien said Nurmi had been offered \$3000 a week for twenty weeks by a circuit that he could have taken home \$60,000 on one contract alone for sale of his signature to a manufacturer for a testimonial.

Many other monetary offers also were scorned. Nurmi broke 38 world records, ranging from the three-quarter mile distance to the 10,000 meters run, competing in 48 track meets which took him over more than 15,000 miles.

## VIEWS VARY ON FIGHT WINNER

NEW YORK, May 29.—Mike McTigue will go into the ring at the Yankee stadium at 10 o'clock tonight to defend his world's light-heavyweight crown against Paul Berlenbach, knockout king.

Berlenbach is a favorite with many, but assurances by the champion that he is in excellent trim and that his right hand is working to order, have given some fans a different view of the battle.

These figure McTigue will outmart the challenger after Paul has punched himself out. McTigue has been much criticized since he won the title for purely defensive tactics in no-decision fights. There will be a decision tonight.

Berlenbach is confident of winning by a knockout and intends to draw McTigue from his defensive shell and force him to swap blows during the 15 rounds.

## COAST CONFERENCE MEET IS OPEN

SEATTLE, May 29.—(A. P.)—Athletes of eight Pacific coast schools had a forenoon of cool weather with occasional rains for the qualifying trials of the annual Pacific intercollegiate conference track meet in the University of Washington stadium here today. The finals are tomorrow.

The university of Washington, Oregon, Stanford, Montana and Idaho, and Oregon Agricultural, Washington State and Whitman colleges each entered fourteen men in the 15 events on the program of the meet.

The preliminaries included the 100 and 220 yard dashes, the high and low hurdles and the javelin, discus and shot events.

Glen Hartranft and Bill Richardson, Stanford; Jimmy Charteris, of Washington and Russell Sweet, Montana, were the outstanding stars entered.
