'ALCOHOLUS' DOES WELL CONSIDERING IN MENTAL TESTS

It is a remarkably good thing that the Volstead act was in effect and that bootleggers are so scarce, as Medford people are still sober today—very much so—following the Alcoholus stunt given at the Craterian theater last night by the Crater club as an adjunct to the regular film performance.

Alcoholus, whose identity is unknown except that he is one of the big guns of the Crater club, was splendidly all right himself and looked retchingly cute and beautiful in a made-up face, which is a big improvement over his everyday one, and a young—Shirley-like costume.

But this witty gentleman of mystery with uncanny knowledge was greatly handicapped by the fact that a number of Craters acted as ushers, thereby spoiling the natural beauty of the handsome theater, and the comfort of the audience. It must be admitted though that their presence lent an added atmosphere of mystery, as most of the audience kept wondering why they should be allowed to perambulate thru the lobby and down the aisles occasionally, let alone exist.
