

STATE TO CONTINUE LOCAL BRANCH FOR LAND SETTLEMENT

The Land Settlement department of the Medford Chamber of Commerce was highly elated today when advised that the state development work would continue and that Mr. Foster, the southern Oregon representative would be retained to assist this department in local land settlement work. The instruction read as follows:

"Decision by the board of directors of the chamber and the trustees of the \$250,000 Oregon development fund subscribed two years ago by Portland business men, to raise an additional fund of \$250,000, means that the campaign for state-wide development will be continued for another two years."

The West Cradle Of Rowing Coaches

The nation is taking rowing lessons from the west. Most of the university crews that will compete June 22 in the Poughkeepsie regatta on the Hudson are coached by western men.

The winning crew at the Olympic games used the stroke that was originated and developed in the west.

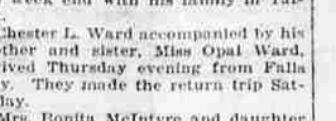
