

STATE TEACHERS EXAMINATIONS AT J'VILLE, JUNE 10-13

The June State Teachers examinations will be held in Jacksonville on June 10 to 13, inclusive, at the courthouse, commencing at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, the 10th.

Applicants must present themselves for the examinations they wish to take at the time set for the question envelopes to be opened, as the examinations cannot be offered at any other time or place.

The eleven subjects required for a one year elementary certificate are named first after each hour assignment, below on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

CHERRY SHIPMENTS AND POTATOES, TOO, TO BE INSPECTED

County Agent C. C. Cate calls the attention of the growers of Jackson county that California has placed quarantines on Oregon cherries and potatoes and points out how to meet these conditions, in the following communication today:

"California has placed a quarantine on shipments of potatoes from Oregon on account of Colorado Potato Beetle which has been found in some sections of eastern Oregon. However modification of this quarantine has been authorized to permit shipments of potatoes from Jackson county, provided they have been inspected before shipment.

"Growers should keep this in mind and not endeavor to ship any potatoes into California without inspection as they will undoubtedly be returned at the expense of the shipper. Any grower wishing to ship potatoes into the state of California should file his name and address with the county agent's office so that inspection can be made and thus prevent loss to the shipper.

"On account of the cherry fruit maggot, which has made its appearance in some sections in Oregon where cherries are grown, California placed an absolute quarantine on the entire state, prohibiting the shipment of cherries to California. But the fact has been established to the satisfaction of the California authorities that the cherry fruit maggot has not made its appearance in Josephine and Jackson counties, and the California authorities have modified the quarantine so that cherries can now be shipped to California from Josephine and Jackson counties, providing a certificate of inspection accompanies each shipment.

"All cherry growers who expect to ship cherries to California should communicate with the county agent's office, and see that arrangements for inspection are made. Until this pest makes its appearance in these counties, shipment will be allowed to go into California under the inspection plan. Growers should be certain that each shipment is accompanied with a certificate saying that this fruit was grown in Josephine or Jackson county, otherwise it might be confiscated.

"A special inspector has been appointed from the Ashland district, and shipments going out of Talent, Medford, Central Point or Gold Hill, will be inspected by the regular inspection force."

Ammunition Received For Camp Jackson

A car load and a half of ammunition for use of infantry and in the Howitzer and 75 centimeter big guns, at the National Guard encampment here June 12 to 26 arrived Monday and is being unloaded and taken to Camp Jackson by Captain Ralph Cowgill and his men who are erecting the camp. Splendid progress is being made at the camp and the work will probably be completed by the last of this week.

FLYING SQUADRON IS HERE WEDNESDAY

In support of constitutional government, the renowned flying squadron with two national known speakers will visit Medford for one day next week, Wednesday, June 10. The flying squadron assisted by local officials will conduct one of its celebrated conferences on the afternoon of that date with Norma C. Brown, one of America's most noted women giving the chief address.

Hon. Oliver Wayne Stewart, president of the Flying Squadron Foundation, and one of the most noted national speakers, will direct the conference and in the evening will be heard by the Medford people. These meetings are scheduled to be held in the First Christian church. The local district attorney's office as well as other officers are heartily cooperating to make this occasion one of great importance to the community.
