OPEN NEW ANGLES IN C. P. HEARING COMMISSION ASKS

SALEM, Ore., June 4.—"If our petition for a re-opening of the Central Pacific control case is granted," said William P. Ellis, attorney for the Oregon commission today, "a hearing will undoubtedly be had on the several cases within the next sixty or ninety days at which time both the Straborn and Hill line applications will be considered together with the commission's petition. This hearing will be vastly different in many respects than the one held last summer on the Oregon commission's complaint. There the issue was whether Oregon was to have additional railroad lines. In the forthcoming hearing the question will be not whether we are to have the railroads but rather who is to be permitted to build them. Examiner Kephart in his report suggested that both the cross-state line from Crane to Odell and the line to Lakeview should be built by the Union Pacific system.

DECIDE OWNERSHIP OF SAND ISLAND IN COURT ACTION

SALEM, Ore., June 4.—That the question of whether the state of Oregon or the federal government is the rightful owner of Sand Island, in the mouth of the Columbia river will be determined in court sometime certainly yesterday when the state land board granted to the Columbia River Packers association a lease to the fishing rights of the island.
