

### WORK ON ASHLAND NORMAL SCHOOL TO START NEXT MONTH

ASHLAND, June 3.—State Superintendent Churchill was honored guest of speaker at the Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon today. It is his belief that actual work will be started in the Southern Oregon Normal late in July or early in August. At a meeting of the board of regents June 18, a tentative plan for the building will be presented and they hope to let the contracts in the near future. It is expected that the school will open its summer session about a year from now and the regular work begin the fall of 1926. Superintendent Churchill will be the normal's first president, expects to go east in October, after leading normals. After this period of inspection a course of study for the school will be prepared and a faculty selected. Much of interest concerning the course was said and the proposed buildings and the site came in for a share of attention. It is expected that there will be at least 200 students in attendance when school opens in the fall of 1926. F. C. Homer, graduate of the old normal after recommending that the site be made available at once alluded happily to the welcome that the first class would receive from the old alumni.

### LIBRARY SYSTEM IN JACKSON COUNTY IS SECOND IN STATE

Comparative figures received recently from the Oregon state library show that the library system of Jackson county with the central at Medford still stands next to the Multnomah county system with central at Portland, in amount of work done. The total number of books circulated in Jackson county in 1924 was 166,761, about 9,000 more than the previous record made. The number of deposit stations in homes and schools have increased. The largest number of books read in any branch library were issued from Jacksonville, with Mrs. K. O. Merrifield in charge. Rogue River public library, in charge of Mrs. Oscar Shepherd occupied a very close second place.

The comparative percentages for 1924 indicated that the largest amount of reference work with the residents of the community and schools was done at Battle Falls, in charge of Miss Hazel Taylor, with Eagle Point second, in charge of Mrs. J. F. Brown. The greatest proportion of children's books were read at Central Point, Mrs. R. H. Moore, librarian, with Jacksonville second.

The Gold Hill library, under Mrs. A. E. Kellough, accomplished for 1924 an improvement in the character of the work done and increased the amount of work done 250 per cent over 1923. Other branches are located at Talent and Sams Valley, with a new one added at Phoenix this year.

The growth in the book collection and the amount of work to be done, has made it necessary to take over the auditorium in the central library at Medford for library purposes and it will therefore be impossible for the library to accommodate in future any large public meetings. Small groups will continue to use the small club room.

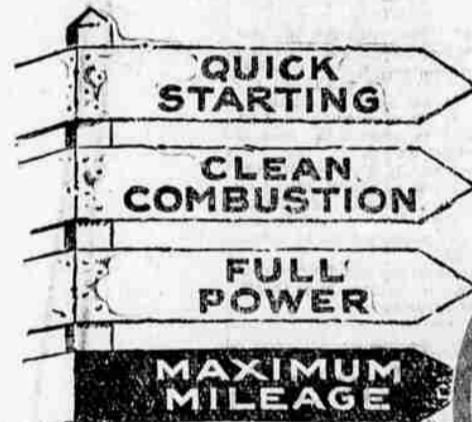
