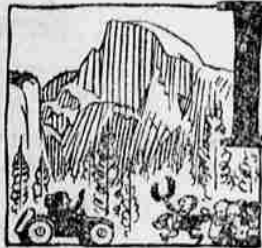

ROGUE RIVER PAYS LAST TRIBUTE TO BELOVED CITIZEN

ROGUE RIVER, June 3.—Gloom was cast over the entire community Friday when it became known that Joe Burkhardt had passed away that morning at 4 o'clock. Joe has been sick for over three months and his friends had been hoping he would regain his health, although it looked doubtful. Everything was done for his comfort that medical aid and loving hands could do. He was born in Rogue River March 27, 1895 and was 30 years, 2 months, 2 days of age at the time of his death. The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Presbyterian church, Rev. Gra and Rev. Wilson officiating. Interment in the Rogue River cemetery. Mr. Burkhardt was a member of the Woodville Lodge I. O. O. F. No. 217, also Live Oak Rebekah lodge No. 218. The Odd Fellows had charge of the services at the grave. The friends extend their sympathy to the relatives in this, their hour of sorrow.
