STATE BOARD OF HIGHER CURRICULA HEARS ARGUMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—The state board of higher curricula was in session here today considering appeal of the University of Oregon asking that the Oregon Agricultural college be prohibited from presenting certain courses held to be assigned to the university.

The board went into session at 10:30 reviewing the briefs filed by both colleges and also the stenographic notes of verbal remarks by representatives of both institutions.

No faculty members of either institution attended the session, which was strictly a conference between the board members on their findings from study of the briefs and the minutes of the earlier meeting.

Dr. C. J. Smith, chairman, said at the opening of the meeting that a final decision may not be given, as further lines for examination may be brought up by members of the board at the conference.

The charges of duplication of courses were filed against the Agricultural college by the university, the lines involved being commerce, journalism, music, education and liberal arts. In its brief in reply the college charged the university with duplication of courses in commerce which had previously been adjudicated to the agricultural institution.

LUTHERANS REPEAT THEY STILL ADHERE TO HELL REALITY

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Renewal of discussions regarding substitution of words in the second article of the apostles' creed appeared likely as the synodical council of the Lutheran Augustana synod met here today to prepare the business to come before its convention next week.

The synod last year voted to substitute "hades" for "hell" in the apostles' creed, as well as to change "holy ghost" to "holy spirit." Both changes were made to conform to the American standard version of the Bible, which has been adopted as more accurate than the King James translation. The council announced that the substitution did not imply a repudiation of the doctrine of the existence of hell, but related only to the state of Christ following his crucifixion and death.

The meeting also disclosed efforts would be made to have the synod rescind its action requiring pastors to wear robes while officiating in church.
