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SOVIET HAND IN PRESENT PLAN TO CONTROL CHINA

WASHINGTON, June 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Information has reached the Associated Press pointing to a direct Russian soviet participation in an impending armed struggle for the control of all China. The preparations already made contemplate a civil war of major proportions, centering in the northern provinces and dwarfing in importance the present outbreaks in the south. The ultimate political consequences can only be conjectured. The area of probable activities is the center of greatest interest to Japan and the aid of the soviet is being thrown behind the standards of Feng Yu-Hsiang, leader of the faction least friendly to Tokyo. Opposing Feng stands Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian war lord, reported to have the moral, if not the actual physical support of the Japanese government.

CANTON, June 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Civil administrators quartered behind prepared fortifications today expected a clash momen-

tarily owing to tyrannical military domination. Inhabitants are fleeing to Hongkong. Martial law is proclaimed here nightly. The civil administration anticipates a treacherous military attack. The merchants who have suffered considerably are demanding action against the military establishments with the ultimate idea that a peaceful civil government under the Kuomintang party may be placed in power. Leaders of the Kuomintang party today denied the charge of fostering communistic ideas, asserting that socialism and democracy is the aim of the organization. Banks closed today as money and valuables were placed in the foreign settlement for safekeeping. Wu Te-Chen, police commissioner, and other prominent officials are reticent regarding the situation.

8 YR. OLD BOY IS HELD FOR MURDER

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 5.—(By Associated Press.)—Eight-year-old John Veros of Lowell was indicted for murder today by the Middlesex grand jury. The boy admitted to police that he and a six year old companion pushed Vivian Husson, 18 months into the Merrimac river and threw stones at the body until it sank. The prisoner was too young to face criminal prosecution.

RIFFIANS LAUNCH DRIVE ON TAQUINAT IN MODERN STYLE

PARIS, June 5.—The Riffian tribesmen have launched the strongest and best organized offensive since their invasion of French Morocco with a drive against Taquinat in the middle of the front. Official reports say Abd-El-Krim's men temporarily gained some ground, crossing the Ouergha at several points but were repelled by the French. The latter in a series of counter attacks re-occupied some of the posts north of the stream which were abandoned during the voluntary evacuation of that zone last week. The Riffian offensive was conducted with the greatest fierceness; the tribesmen have yet shown. Abd-El-Krim used Riffian regulars, his best shock troops in the attacks, but the French declare they were mowed down by machine gun fire and that their losses were extremely heavy. The Riffians used no artillery, but their forces were larger than in any previous operation of the campaign. The pitched battle lasted from daybreak to sunset yesterday, French reports said. Abd-El-Krim's shock

troops got their first real taste of modern warfare in a stunning defeat in which the Riffians lost hundreds of dead and many prisoners. The Riffian warriors fought valiantly but were forced back by the French from all points north of the Ouergha river. The fierceness and stubbornness of Abd-El-Krim's attack was interpreted by the French as meaning his adherence to his original intention to reach Fez. Taquinat, his immediate objective is the key to the crossing of the Ouergha.

STATE GRANGERS ON AUTO RIDE

DALLAS, Ore., June 5.—Delegates to the annual convention of the State Grange were this morning enjoying automobile trips to points of interest in Polk county, ending with an inspection of the Grange on normal school. This afternoon the convention will tackle a mass of resolutions, which will define the organization's policies for the ensuing year. The convention late yesterday went on record as favoring an effort for a new state income tax and instructed State Master Palmer to appoint a committee to work with other organizations to form a tax league. This league would not only work for an income tax law but would conduct a campaign against the Davis resolution which would put the state on record as opposed to any income tax for fifteen years.

CHILEANS ANGERED BY SUPPRESSION

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—A delicate situation is reported in the nitrate region following the closing of two communist newspapers at Iquique. Clashes are said to have taken place but due to the censorship the details are vague. Dispatches received here said a crowd attacked the Coruna works, seizing the offices and mortally wounding an employee. The others and the manager escaped. Uprisings were started in two other factories and machine gunners were landed from a cruiser to suppress the disorders. In one of the encounters two policemen were killed. The dispatches say the government has the situation well in hand.

PROBE MYSTERY OF MISSING \$5700

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—(By Associated Press.) Postoffice Inspector Charles E. Caine said today no progress had been made toward uncovering any clue leading to solution of the disappearance several days ago from the mails between Reno, Nev., and Floriston, Cal., of a package containing \$5700 in currency, part of the payroll of the Crown-Willamette Paper company at Floriston. Reports said the package had gone forward from the Reno postoffice but failed to arrive at Floriston. Two deputy inspectors from the San Francisco office have been detailed on the case, Chief Caine said.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—Federal Judge R. S. Bean today granted a motion for a directed verdict dismissing charges of misuse of the mails against John L. Etheridge, Portland bond dealer. The government charged that Etheridge in selling bonds of a Seattle local improvement district had misrepresented that they were backed by the credit of the entire city of Seattle.
